Economic Commission which contain reflections on the Indian Community do not represent the views of His Majesty's Government.

4. The speech was unfortunately incorrectly reported and this fact appears to have given rise to the passing of these resolutions. In reading the extract from the Report of the Economic Commission, the point made by Mr. Major was that the Report, and in particular the extract quoted, was not the result of racial bias but of evidence taken by the Commission, such evidence going to prove the necessity for race segregation. I considered that there was no objection to Mr. Major availing himself of the opportunity afforded by the debate to explain the conclusions arrived at by the Economic Commission, and the considerations actuating them.

Resolutions passed unanimously at a Mass Meeting of Indians on Sunday, the 6th March, 1921.

Resolution No. 1.

This Mass Meeting of the Indian citizens of Kenya expresses its keen resentment and disappointment at the passive and partial attitude adopted by His Excellency the Governor of Colony and Protectorate of Kenya when presiding over the proceedings of the Meeting of the Legislative Council on the 24th January, 1921, when the Health Bill was under discussion inasmuch as His Excellency permitted to be read by Mr. F. W. Major, the Commissioner of Customs that libellous and disgraceful portion of the Economic Commission Report which has been officially condemned and repudiated by His Majesty's Imperial Government.

Resolution No. 2.

This Mass Meeting further expresses its strong indignation at the outrageous and unconstitutional conduct of Mr. F. W. Major, the Commissioner of Customs in deliberately ignoring the feelings of the whole Indian Nation by repeating in the Council the falsehood contained in the said portion of the Economic Committee Report in regard of the people of India in direct defiance of the policy of His Majesty's Imperial Government and this meeting most earnestly urges His Majesty's Government to remove Mr. Major from his office in this Colony immediately so his presence

of Customs during debate in Committee of
Council on the Segregation Clauses of the
Public Health Bill.

Influence of Indians.

The Commissioner of Customs spoke of the report of the Economic Commission of which he had been chairman. The members of that Commission had been accused of racial bias. Their remarks had been made in perfect good faith; the members had given their best attention and pains to the subject.

Mr. Major then gave the following extract from the Economic Commission's Report :

"Physically, the Indian is not a wholesome influence because of his uncurable repugnance to sanitation and hygiene. In this respect the European is more civilised than the Indian, being naturally cleanly in his ways; but he is prone to follow the example of those around him. Plague, though held to be endemic in the country, has certainly been imported, if not originally, then on later occasions, from Europe, and Indian quarters are always favourably situated for such massive outbreaks. The same applies with regard to other serious diseases. The Indian is ignorant and sceptical of the importance of personal hygiene not only to himself but to possibly the whole of the country."
