Action of Indians - segregation

Enclosed copy of telegram from Mr. G. H. Giffen, Secretary of State for India, dated 23 March 1921, regarding the proposed changes in the Public Health Bill. In addition, note through Sir George Segregation in residential areas, and a proposal to regard commercial areas & residential areas as separate. Request authority to amend the Public Health Bill without applying clause 15 before coming into force.

The Governor proposed some reasonable changes in the Bill, and in a friendly way he would be most willing to make arrangement with them.

The Gov. has replied with a telegram, of which Mr. Montagu is now in receipt in the next notice. The telegram was dated 16 March.

If he is allowed to do so, the Public Health Dept. wishes to understand that they do not consider segregation is not applied without sufficient cause, he will have no difficulty in withdrawing the notice, as I have suggested.

1. In view of the fact that the Indian population
is increasing so rapidly, the Indian population
now exceeds the available land area, the existing
schools and all rest of 1910 Indian living within the
limits of 8000 Indians seems to expect their permanent
and future life by borders of the United States and
as such should be maintained to satisfy the
needs of the same Indian for schools and other
things as now exist for Indians east of the river.

2. In view of the fact that 1000 Indians
now live in the country and a large number of them
are now over capacity of the existing schools
and the Indian who want to attend schools at no time
can do so because of the lack of facilities or
the lack of sufficient room to accommodate all students to
attend the schools that have been built in
the country. This has caused many Indians to leave
the country and go to Canada where they can get
a better education and also have more opportunities
than here to make a living and also have more opportunities

PARAPHRASED TELEGRAM

From the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor of Kenya.

(Sent 3 p.m. 31st March, 1921.)

31st March. - With reference to your telegram of 23rd March I am practically committed with the Secretary of State for India to the withdrawal of Mombasa notice and am anxious if it is at all possible not to go back on my undertaking. Public Health Ordinance raises questions of such vital importance that it is impossible to take any action with regard to it in absence of Secretary of State but matter will be taken up immediately on his return and every effort made to inform you as soon as possible of decision. It would not appear in the meantime that construction can be seriously prejudiced by withdrawal of the notice as presumably no building operations can actually start for some little time before which it may be hoped that Ordinance will be in force.
