SUBJECT

WOMEN POSTAL CLERKSMARRIAGE GRATUITIES

Agreed officers resigning prior to completion of two years service in Kenya should forfeit any gratuity from Colonial funds, but considers she should draw gratuity from Imperial funds in respect of service in British P.O. Suggests inclusion in passage agreement of clause providing for lien on gratuity for purpose of recovering passage money.

SIR,

I have the honour to refer to your telegram of the 6th May on the subject of the marriage gratuities payable to female postal employees seconded from the British Post Office, and to record my endorsement of your view that in the event of an officer resigning prior to the completion of two years residential service in Kenya, she should be called upon to forfeit any gratuity from Colonial funds.

2. I share your reluctance, however, to extend such forfeiture to gratuities for which an officer has qualified by actual service in England, and I consider it would only be equitable to allow her, in such circumstances, to draw a gratuity at the expense of the British Post Office at the rate, and under the same conditions, as would have applied had she left the Home Service on the date of her secondment to this Colony.

With reference to the discussion

which took place at the G.P.O. on the
3rd May, with regard to the proportion
of the Imperial and Kenya funds of themarriage gratuities of female Postal
Clerks, I am etc. to transmit to you,to be laid before the P.M.G., the
enclosed copy of a telegram which wassent to the Governor following on
that discussion together with a copy

of a despatch from the Governor which

has been received in reply. Mr. Churchill

will be glad to be informed whether the

less than two years' service in East Africa
and six years qualifying service in all
(qualifying service includes Established
Service either in the Colonial or in the
Home Service, and any full time Unestablished
Service paid for directly out of monies
provided by the Imperial Parliament), the
gratuity will be calculated separately in
respect of each period of the service in
accordance with the principles of Rule 9 of
the Rules of the 31st July, 1911, framed under
Section 7 (1) of the Superannuation Act, 1909,
but the total gratuity will not in any case
exceed one month's pay at the date of
retirement in respect of each completed year
of Established Service with a maximum of
twelve months' pay.

If an officer resigns to be married before
she has completed two years' service in East
Africa, she will forfeit all claim to gratuity
in respect of her Colonial Service, but will be
granted such gratuity as she may be qualified
for in respect of her Home Service.

I am to take the present opportunity of
stating that Mr. Churchill concurs generally in the
conclusions reached at the discussion above referred

Sir,

I have the honour to request that your sanction may be accorded as required by Part VI of the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, to the alienation of a small area of Native Reserve to a syndicate of local settlers who desire to erect a Hydro-Electric plant under the following circumstances.

2. The land in question consists of 20 ac. of the Fort Hall Native Reserve, the extra edge of the reserve border which is given out as farms, on the native side, as is shown in red on the attached map of the district. A large scale plan of the actual portion alienated is also attached.

3. The alienation of the land has been supported by the Chief Native Commissioner and the administrative officer concerned after consulting the native authorities who have expressed no objection to the proposal. The question of compensation has not arisen


