- THAT this descention of associations depression the initiation of any policy which will tend to make Kenya Colony either dependent on, or a dependency of, India."
- "THAT this Convetien resents the determined efforts of a section of the community to determine the pledge given by the Secretary of State for the Colonies as promulgated in Government Metice No. 281 of August 18th, 1920. This pledge was given by the Secretary of State after receiving a deputation from the Indian Community of Hast Africa. The deputation was introduced by Lord Islangton, who stated that the franchise could not be granted to Indians on the same basis as to Burepeans. This pledge confirmed Lord Elgin's earlier decision to retain the upland areas of the Colony as the special sphere of European settlement and it is neteworthy that the present Secretary of State was then Under Secretary of State. That, Since this pledge is the foundation of European settlement in the Righlands of Memya Colony, the European Community cannot submit to any diminution of the rights promised by it. and is prepared to combat by every constitutional means any attempted breach of this pledge.

Hon. the Becretary of State should earefully study the wishes and seneider the penision of the native population who are being raised from from a condition of savagory and the in censiderable numbers are being trained and educated in accordance with Western ideals, which form the basis of the present scheme of Mative Education and Administration, and should assertain the opinion of the various Missionary Societies in the Colony on this point. "THAT this Convention claims for the Legislative Council the inherent function, proclaimed by the Imperial Conference of 1917, to enjoy complete control over the composition of the population of this Colony by means of restriction up to the ultimate point of prohibition of immigration from Asia: and, further, urges upon the Rt. Hen, the Secretary of State for the Colonies that to take any desiries on this vital subject, which may limit this. Sir.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 942 of the 7th of July forwarding copies of resolutions on the subject of Indian policy in Kenya which were passed by the Convention of Associations at Nairobi in June 1921.

I have informed you that no decision will be taken in regard to Indian policy at any rate until Sir Edward Northey has returned to Kenya and discussed the matter further in the Colony. The Convention is no doubt now aware of the position, but I should be glad if in acknowledging on my behalf the receipt of copies of their resolutions, you would draw attention to this announcement, and say that

that they may be assured that careful consideration will be given to their views before a decision is arrived at.
