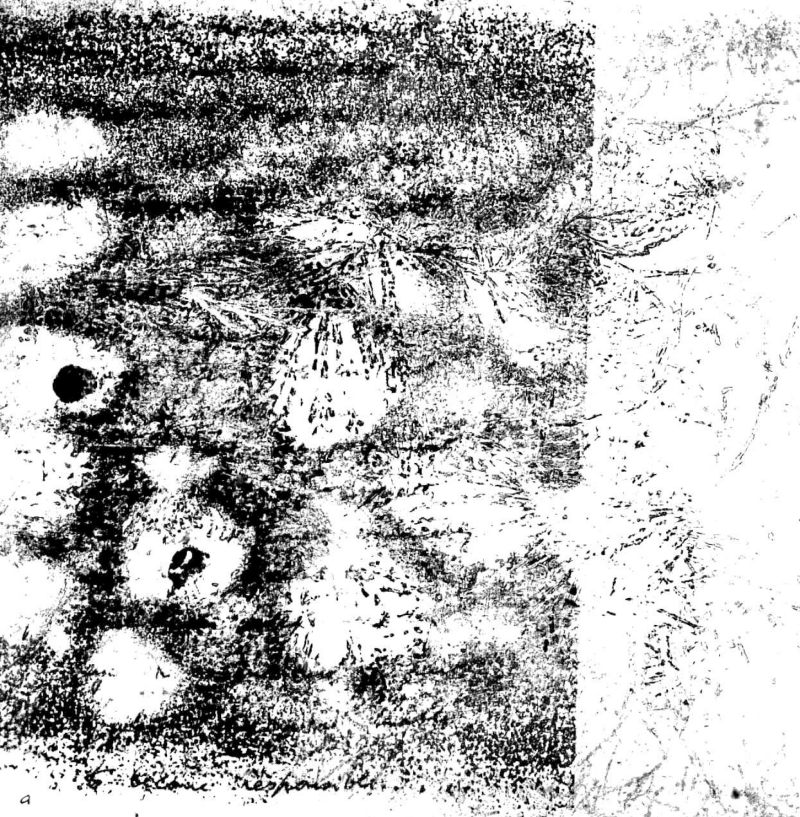

I regret that no report of this action was submitted to the Colonial Office, but can only re-affirm the contention that it was thought that local conditions justified special treatment: I submit, moreover, that the fact that the War Office decision was not conveyed until April, 1919, warranted such a course, as a strict interpretation of the home practice automatically would have disqualified personnel

released at or immediately after the Armistice, who had no previous advice of the War Office, and could not have obtained it owing to the shortage of communication facilities and the exceptional demand for personnel.

3. I am unable to admit that the original notice attaches to the original notice attaches to the original notice, which were given no official intimation of the African Rifles Regulations, and took no part in the drafting of the instructions to the African Rifles Headquarters, which was controlling all Forces in the Colonies in independent communication with the State. It is a matter for regret that at the time it was not known that the War Office was unaware of any restriction in this respect, and considered that as no specific limit was contained in the decisions conveyed to him, the matter was left to his discretion in the light of local conditions.

4. You are aware of the serious financial position of this Colony, and I express the hope that you will

be disposed to approach the War Office again with a view to a re-consideration of their unwillingness to shoulder this additional burden, which Kenya has no funds to meet. PARAPHRASE telegram from the Officer Administering the Government of Kenya to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Dated 5th August

(Received Colonial Office 6.50 a.m. 8th August 1921).

The confidential despatch 29th April and your statement of 20th June have been received. The arrival of the 1,000 rifles was one of the main reasons for the decision of the central government instead of the local government. The Officer in Charge has been instructed to inform the local government that he will maintain order. The local government has approved this policy and the situation.

Further details between the local government and the central government are being held in order to avoid any action against the local government. It is necessary to invest of two

to three months.
