LAND SALES

States continued holding up pending general settlement of Indian Policy is causing inconvenience and delaying trade and progress together with loss of revenue from stand premia and rent. Urges Milner policy be acted upon until end of 1922 and requests authority to auction plots without reservation in commercial areas of large towns.

MINUTES

The "Milner policy," so far as it relates to land and townships, was as follows:

(1) Separate areas for occupation by Europeans and Asiatics in residential, and whenever practicable, in commercial areas.

(2) Acquisition of land by Europeans in the Asiatic area and vice versa to be forbidden whether by direct Government action or by transfer between individuals.

The instructions sent to Sir E. Northcote for his guidance in endeavouring to obtain a settlement were as follows:-

(1) No commercial segregation.
(2) No residential segregation for persons
on the common electoral roll; i.e. better class
Indians can live where they like, but the lower
would be excluded from the European quarter.

The Government's New Response

(1) Sale without reservation in the
commercial areas of Japan.

(2) In other respects, and principally in the case of new townships, the adoption of the "Miller policy".

In the first place, as the Secretary of State has definitely ruled that there should be no commercial segregation, I do not think it possible to confine sale of commercial areas without reservation to the large towns.

Apart from this, it is obvious that any sale of Crown land, with ~~a~~ limitation as to bidding, will put us into the agitation which we have had for the last 2 years, and I should have thought it would have fatally prejudiced the Governor's attempt to obtain a settlement by agreement. If we are to make a settlement, we cannot afford to believe that we are pre-judging the result.

If, on the other hand, the answer is told that until a settlement is achieved, all sales of Government land in townships which are considered to be necessary must be made without reservation, we shall, no doubt, to some extent be pre-judging the issue in the other direction. This is the smaller of the two evils. If the European is unwilling to bid for land on the Government residential sites because of his fear of having an Indian on the next plot he will prefer to take up one of the private plots referred to in the second paragraph of the

Land Sales in Kenya.

Since you spoke to me about this question, I have given it further consideration in the light of your general direction that the present policy should hold the field until a new policy has been substituted.

The policy that technically holds the field is the "Milner" policy, which laid down Segregation between Europeans and Asiatics in residential and (whenever practical) in commercial areas also. This applied equally to occupation, as well as to acquisition of land.

Although no new policy has yet been substituted, your secret instructions sent to Sir Edward Northey recently for his guidance in endeavouring to obtain a settlement, embody a change in the "Milner" policy in favour of the Asiatic, and contemplate no commercial segregation, and no residential segregation for persons on the common electoral roll.

It has hitherto been thought advisable that Sir Edward Northey should "go slow" on the "Milner" policy, until it was known whether Sir Edward Northey had succeeded in evolving the settlement based upon his secret instructions,

that the chances of a settlement
are not in fact likely to be
jeopardised by the action he proposes
to take.

not be jeopardized by your request for grant of
authority to auction plots on conditions defined. I
approve on this understanding.
