In continuation of my despatch No. 1545 of the 7th instant forwarding the Appropriation Bill for 1922, I have the honour to send you the following statement which, I trust you will find, puts the facts and figures touching the Kenya finances for next year more concisely and clearly than my despatch above mentioned which went very fully into details.

2. The year is expected to open with a deficit, after taking into account contingent liabilities, of £600,000. This is due partly to overexpenditure in the year 1919-20 on account of War Bonus, and partly to deficiency of Revenue in the current nine months of 1921. The deficiency of £600,000 is however reducible by £394,195 payable out of the £5,000,000 to cover Military Expenditure due to the War. The deficiency in Revenue for the current year is, to a large extent, due to overestimation of Income Tax, of which it is doubtful if £100,000 will be realised out of £328,000 estimated. Owing to shortage of rains and lack of employment Native Hut and Poll Tax is likely to be £100,000 short.

3. Though the balancing of the budget for 1922 appeared, at first, to be beyond the bounds of possibility,

possibility, if the functions of the Government were to be maintained, the achievement was made practicable by the removal of restrictions upon increasing the Customs Duties, enabling the estimated revenue therefrom to be raised by £241,200; by the decision that the local allowance of European Officials should be reduced by half on April 1st 1922, enabling expenditure thereon to be curtailed by £79,700; and by deferring £1,400 of estimated interest on the Public account of Loan Funds appropriated, and due to the large balance of these funds. By means of these adjustments, notwithstanding the expenditure the estimated revenue and expenditure have been made to coincide.

4. The total estimated Revenue for 1922 is £1,946,376, which is £1,300,000 less than the estimate of the previous year. The reduction in the estimated actual collection is due to the following. The increase on the estimated collection is due to be few, if chief, by Customs Duties. The reduction in the estimate of the Revenue for 1922 is mainly under the heads of Income Tax, Estate Duty, Income Tax, Market and Land Taxes, and Railway Contribution. The reduction of the estimated Revenue depends upon the economic conditions, than those at present existing in the Colony, which it is hoped that a decrease in unemployment to be brought about by prosecution of Loan Works, and better rainfall, will produce.

5. Of the total estimated expenditure for 1922 £1,899,944

estimated is recurrent, and £46,432 is special. Of the general expenditure £7,000 is for payment of instalments due to the Military Salvage for stores and buildings already taken over, and £23,100 is to meet emergent demands, which may arise during the year, for buildings or new roads and bridges. £7,000 is provided for a new School at Kitale, the Headquarters of the Trans-Nzolia, where there are 62 European children with no educational facilities. The necessity for this School has been previously admitted by the Government, and the intention to provide for this out of Loan Funds has been expressed, but such funds are not now available. £2,000 is for Roads in the Northern Frontier District which are necessary for the distribution of food to garrisons etc. £4,900 is for Telegraph and Telephone extensions and improvements.

6. The estimated recurrent expenditure is £82,778 less than the actual recurrent expenditure for the year 1920-21. The increase is accounted for by the fact that 3 months of the 1920-21 King's African Rifles expenditure, representing some £40,000, was not charged off in the accounts of that year owing to delay in receipt of debits; Pensions have increased by £10,000; Medical and Educational recurrent votes were increased in 1921 for work in Native Reserves upon which the increase in Native Hut and Poll Tax was conditional; the Defence Force has added £4,675, the Postal Services were improved and extended by the addition of £84,836 to the Post Office vote in 1921; and £12,000 more is required for Interest.

Compared

compared with the estimates for 1922, the estimates for 1923 show a decrease in recurrent expenditure of £200,000. Sixty one European appointments have been suspended. It has not been found possible to offset economy by suspending more, as other appointments are either absolutely indispensable, or are at present occupied. The discharge of the holders of occupied posts means, in many cases, payment of leave pay for the greater part of 1922; and additional expenditure, in the way of passages and gratuities on retirement, would therefore be the result of such a course. It is probable that in the course of the year vacancies will occur enabling further economies to be effected in this manner. Other reductions effected cover all the economies which can be immediately foreseen, and are to some extent dependent upon Heads or Departments not being too rigidly bound down by the exact amounts allowed under each subhead of their votes, but it is hoped in the course of the year to discover other means of retrenchment.

7. New appointments and services, not already sanctioned, are confined to the following meagre

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
