INSTRUCTIONS REFERRED TO ON PAGE 1.

EAST AFRICAN PROTECTORATES
AND UGANDA RAILWAY.

If this Paper of Particulars and the Certificates connected with it, be not
in original, the copies must be duly attested

HEAD 1.—In the case of an Officer serving on the West Coast of Africa, a statement is to be made whether he is a native of that Coast. (Colonial Regulations, 1480).

HEAD 3.—State the description of Allowance for which an Award is recommended, viz. Superannuation, Compensation, Commutation Allowance, or Gratuity, and the amount. In the case of Pension, showing an addition to their Pensions in respect of any service under special qualifications, should be stated, and a reference should be given to the order under which this claim is made.

HEAD 5.—If the service has been interrupted by one or more breaks, the number of years and months, and the dates, and the number of breaks should be stated under heading (f).

HEAD 6.—If the Applicant has been in receipt of the same Salary, or Wages at that date should be inserted, preceded by the average annual amount of Salary or Wages for the 36 months immediately preceding the date of retirement, should be inserted, preceded by the word "average," but is less than three years, then the average for the whole period of years.

HEAD 7.—A separate statement should be inserted of the average Annual Values for the preceding retirement of each Emoluments (exclusive of salary or wages) as included in the calculation of the Pension or Gratuity.

Whenver the value of a House or House Allowance is ascertained, the salary and other emoluments which count for Pension purposes, it is to be taken as a sixth of that amount, so that it shall not exceed one-seventh of the whole.

Fees which an officer is allowed to retain for his own use will be taken into account for Pension purposes, with regular salary, at the annual receipts of the net receipts of the officer's statement. These receipts are to be ascertained by the Officer from the gross amount of Fees such Office Expenses, &c., as an officer may have had from his own resources, in performing the services for which he was remunerated by the Government. However from the Fees should be made in respect of Office Expenses provided for Public Funds, for the due discharge of those duties to which a Fixed Salary is annexed. The Particulars when forwarded to the Colonial Department should be accompanied by a statement from the retiring Officers, showing the amount received by them for fees, and the amount retained as above for Office Expenses, &c., in each of the three years immediately preceding retirement. It will be the duty of the Colonial Government to certify the accuracy of such statements before forwarding them to the Colonial Office. Officers receiving Fixed Salaries and Cash on Discharge will not be allowed to count for Pension purposes, to the extent of more than one year's fees will not in any case be allowed to count for Pension purposes during the whole time of the Officers receiving them, was not given to the Public Service.

If the Applicant is below the ordinary age for retirement, a Medical Certificate showing that he is disqualified by infirmity of mind or body for discharging his duty, and that such infirmity is likely to be permanent.

A certificate should be signed by two Officers, one of whom should, if possible, be a superior Officer of the Government.

If the Applicant has had any previous service in the Civil Service of the Colony.

If the Applicant has had any previous service, a statement must be fully given, with a certificate whether or not, during the period of such service, he was in the Civil Service of the Colony.

HEAD 11.—If, in special circumstances, a professional Civil Officer is allowed to have a private practice without forfeiting his claim to Pension, the facts are to be fully stated.

HEAD 14.—If the Applicant is liable to any deduction from his salary under Clause 102 of the Colonial Regulations, the facts should be fully stated.

HEAD 19.—The length of service and other particulars of the computation are to be given. When an average of Salary, &c., is taken, the mode of calculating it (whether by months, &c.) is to be explained.

Can you tell me whether his salary for the period from the 1st April 1965 was transferred from the Transport Department to the Public Works Department of Kenya and whether equal shares by Uganda and Kenya, and whether the pension charge for the period of service subsequent to the transfer of the Combined Transport Department to the Public Works Department of Kenya should properly be borne in equal shares by Uganda and Kenya?
