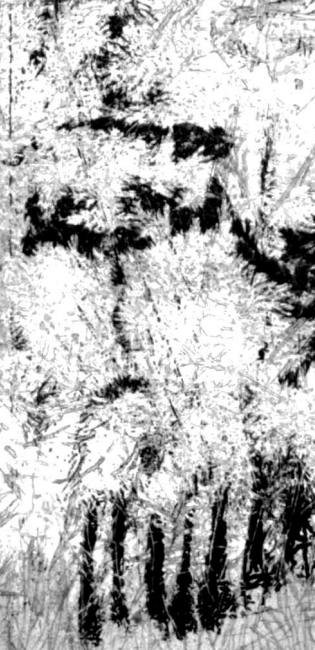

regarded as in any way implying that the nursing sister will be placed upon the pensionable establishment if her service is satisfactory, nor even that her engagement will be continued for a fourth tour.

9. It must be understood that the services of a nursing sister are available for any duties upon which the Governor, in the interests of the public service, may think it desirable to employ her, and that it is within his discretion to station her wherever he may consider that her presence will be most useful. If it is established to the satisfaction of the Governor that a nursing sister is not qualified for efficient service, he has full power, subject to the confirmation of the Secretary of State, to cancel her appointment at any time without giving her any further compensation than a passage back to England, which will be granted only if he is satisfied that she has by her good conduct deserved it.

10. In other respects a nursing sister is subject to the special regulations which apply to the time being, which are contained in the Annual Colonial Office List (published by Messrs. Waterlow and Sons Limited, Great Windmill Street, London, E.C.2), or may be seen on application, either at the Colonial Office or at the office of the Overseas Nursing Association. It is, of course, necessary to read the rules and regulations of the hospital to which she is attached, and to make local rules which may be in conformity with the written approval of the Governor and the assistance of the nursing staff.

11. A nursing sister, on completing the term of service stipulated by her in her Agreement, is entitled to 21 days' "return leave" for every month of residence in a place classed as "healthy" and to 21 days' "vacation leave" for every month of residential service passed in a place classed as "unhealthy". Should a nursing sister on her return to Europe, subsequent to completing a term or period of service, enter into an Agreement to complete a further term or period of service with Government, she should be on the pensionable establishment, and she is entitled to an additional 21 days (or 3 days) per month "return leave".

the time thus granted being the equivalent of the "vacation leave." A nursing sister receives full pay during both her "vacation leave" and her "return leave." The time spent on the voyage to Europe is not included in the time allowed as "vacation leave"; neither is the time spent on the subsequent voyage to East Africa, in the event of re-engagement or the nursing sister being on the pensionable establishment, included in the time allowed as "return leave."

12. *Travelling Expenses.* Necessary travelling expenses (third-class railway fares) between London and a nursing sister's residence in the United Kingdom, are paid by Government when a nursing sister is either proceeding to East Africa or returning from East Africa on completion of her agreed term of service.

13. A nursing sister accepted for employment will be required to be given an advance salary before her departure, but exceeding one month's salary. Any such advance granted will be recovered from the nursing sister's pay by instalments.

13. GRATUITIES

14. At the conclusion of a nursing sister's service she may be succeeded by the Governor to the Secretary of State for a gratuity not exceeding twenty shillings for each completed month of residential service, provided that she has completed the term or period of such residential service.

15. It must, however, be understood that a nursing sister has no claim to this gratuity, and that the full amount will in no case be granted unless her services and conduct have been wholly satisfactory.

16. A small number of nursing appointments, for nursing sisters have been granted. These appointments are exceptional in character, and no nursing sister can be placed upon the pensionable establishment upon the fact that her engagement has been renewed for a second or a third time, she has served for several tours in various departments.

17. Any gratuities that may have been paid under paragraph 14 of this Chapter to a nursing sister will be

afterwards placed on the pensionable establishment and retires on pension are recovered by deductions from her pension, unless the periods of service in respect of which they were granted are not included in the calculation of her pension.

IV. TRAINING IN THE NURSING OF TROPICAL DISEASES.

18. Nursing sisters selected for appointment may, if it is considered necessary and if their parents, by their consent, undergo a course of special instruction in tropical diseases at the Government Medical School, Tropical Medicine, which leads to a diploma in tropical medicine. The instruction will be given at the hospital where the training they will receive, by the Senior Lecturer in Tropical Medicine.

EAST AFRICA.

APPLICATION FOR APPOINTMENTS.

Candidates for the following appointments in East Africa are invited to apply to the Colonial Office.

- 1. Kenya: District Surgeon's Office.
- 2. Tanganyika: District Surgeon's Office.

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The salaries of higher posts, which are usually filled by the promotion of nursing sisters, are as follows—

Hospital Matrons.

(Kenya, Uganda, Zanzibar and Nyassaland) £250 a year, rising by annual increments of £15 to £350 a year.

Senior Nursing Sisters.

(Tanganyika) £250 a year, rising by annual increments of £15 to £350 a year.

6. An allowance of £20 a year towards defraying the cost of purchasing uniform is given in addition to all matrons, and an initial advance of £30 is paid on first appointment.

7. If a nursing sister is appointed to cover the place of a matron or senior nursing sister she will receive at least of course an acting allowance until the first vacancy occurs, but she will not receive an acting allowance until the first vacancy occurs.

8. Candidates for appointments in the East Africa are invited to apply to the Colonial Office, London, and should be accompanied by a certificate from the Registrar of Nurses, London, and a certificate from the Registrar of Nurses, East Africa.

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11. *Leave.*—A nursing sister, on completing the tour of period undertaken by her in her agreement, is eligible for 21 or 3 days "vacation leave" for every month of residential service, according to the station or stations at which she has been posted. Should a nursing sister on her return to Europe, subsequent to completing a tour or period of service with Government, or should she be on the pensionable establishment, she is eligible for an additional 21 or 3 days "return leave" for every month of residential service, the time thus granted being equal to the "vacation leave." A nursing sister receives full pay during both her "vacation leave" and her "return leave," and also on the voyages between East Africa and the United Kingdom. The time spent on the voyage home is not included in the time allowed as "vacation leave," neither is the time spent on the subsequent voyage to East Africa, in the event of re-employment of the nursing sister being on the pensionable establishment, as defined in the regulations.

12. *Passage.*—Free first class passages of and from East Africa to Europe, and all advances are provided by the Government. The transportation by Government railways and steamers is granted in East Africa when a nursing sister is travelling on duty or coming home on leave.

13. *Advances.*—A nursing sister, on being employed with a Government establishment, is given an advance of pay before her departure, not exceeding one month's pay. Advances granted will be repaid from the nursing sister's pay instalments.

14. *Quarters and Household Expenses.*—Free furnished quarters, provided (furnished) with light, water, gas, and laundry, with fuel, and other necessary conveniences, and necessary for a nursing sister, are provided for her and her family, and for her baggage, on the basis of the rates for the same in the regulations. The rates for the use of the quarters are payable by the nursing sister, and are subject to the regulations.

III.—GRATUITIES

15. At the end of a nursing sister's service she may be granted a gratuity by the Government, by the Secretary of State, for a period not exceeding 12 months, or such a shorter period as may be determined by the Secretary of State, on the basis of the regulations. The gratuity is payable in two instalments, the first being payable at the end of the first instalment, and the second at the end of the second instalment, and that the full amount of the gratuity is payable unless the regulations provide otherwise.

16. A few pensionable appointments for nursing sisters have been established. These appointments are reserved for cases of exceptional merit, and no nursing sister can base any claim to be placed on the

pensionable establishment upon the fact that her engagement has been renewed or that she has served for several tours in various Dependencies.

18. Any gratuities that may have been paid under paragraph 16 of this chapter to a nursing sister who is afterwards placed on the pensionable establishment and retires on pension are recovered by deductions from her pension, unless the periods of service in respect of which they were granted are not included in the calculation of her pension.

IV.—TRAINING IN THE NURSING OF TROPICAL DISEASES

19. Nursing sisters selected for appointments where it is considered desirable, and if time permits, are required to undergo a course of training for two or three months at one of the London Schools of Tropical Medicine, Keble College, Oxford, the London School of Tropical Medicine, St. George's Hospital, and the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine, and the Hospital for Tropical Diseases, Liverpool. The cost of the course of training, including the cost of the passage to and from the school, and the cost of the maintenance of the nursing sister during the course of training, is to be paid by the Government.

20. The allowance and maintenance of a nursing sister, while undergoing the course of training, is to be paid by the Government.

21. Nursing sisters who are required to attend any course of instruction directed by the Secretary of State, on their appointment or during leave, are not entitled to leave of absence in such cases, and no gratuities are payable to them.

SPECIAL INFORMATION AS TO APPOINTMENTS IN THE KENYA COLONY AND PROTECTORATE.

1. The Nursing Staff consists of a matron and 27 nursing sisters.
2. The European Hospitals to which nursing sisters are attached are at Mombasa, Nairobi, Kisumu and Eldoret.

A nursing sister in charge of arrangements at the Native Hospital, Mombasa, and it is proposed to extend this system to the other large Native Hospitals throughout the Colony. The staff of the Health Officer of N. Kenya and Nairobi include a matron and sister. The White Centers are being started and in due course the Health Officer will start a similar staff at each.

It is the intention to have a staff of 25 nursing sisters at each of the 25 stations. The staff of each station will be made up of a matron, a sister in charge, and a sister. 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At Dar-es-Salaam and Tabora there are Dispensary Stations attached to the European Hospitals, with 17 beds and 6 beds respectively.

Besides the European Dispensary at Dar-es-Salaam the Senior Nursing Sister supervises the German Wards, and at Tanga and Tabora, when available, the Native Wards are supervised by the European Nursing Staff.

Out-patient clinics are a rule attached to the European wards by trained native nurses, over whom they exercise supervision. Nursing sisters may also be called upon to supervise the work in the Native Hospitals, which are generally associated with, but not always in close proximity to, the European Hospitals.

The following rules are drawn up for the guidance of the European Nursing Staff:

Hospital Staff.

1. The staff of European nursing sisters consists of a senior nursing sister and of one or more nursing sisters, as may from time to time be appointed. In any hospital where a senior nursing sister is not specially appointed, the senior nursing sister will be considered as filling the place of a senior nursing sister.

Medical Officer.

2. The senior nursing sister will be subject to the supervision of the Medical Officer, and will be responsible to him for the management of the nursing staff.

3. The senior nursing sister will be permitted to entertain friends in the hospital, but no other persons will be permitted in the evening hours, unless they are invited by the senior nursing sister.

4. The senior nursing sister will be responsible for the maintenance of the hospital, and will be permitted to use the hospital for the purpose of the hospital.

Arrangement of Nursing Sisters' Duties.

10. She will arrange the duties of the nursing sisters, and will ensure the continuous presence of a sister in the Hospital throughout the day.

Responsibility for Dieting of Patients.

11. She is responsible that the dieting of the European patients is carried out in accordance with the instructions of the medical officer, and that the diet tickets are correctly made out and presented to the cook or stockkeeper, as the case may be, and if required, shall possess the diets provided in any book kept for that purpose. In those Hospitals to which neither wardens, stockkeeper, nor other officer is appointed for this purpose of dealing with local transactions in food-stuff, she will see that any contractor's list or order for stores is correctly made out and signed by the medical officer, presented to the contractor. On receipt she will inspect all stores supplied, and at once report any discrepancy in or falseness of articles to the medical officer.

House-keeping.

12. In Hospitals where fresh food is purchased locally, the senior nursing sister will be chiefly responsible for all purchases.

Correspondence.

13. All communications between the medical officer attached to the Hospital and the nursing staff must pass through the senior nursing sister.

Nursing Sisters - Duties and Hours.

14. The nursing sisters will obey and carry out the instructions of the senior nursing sister. In addition to the senior nursing sister, there can be two nursing sisters at a station, the duty will be taken by them alternately. The senior nursing sister will see that the special duty is set forth in the hospital.

Night Duty.

15. The senior nursing sister will be taken by the nursing sisters, the senior nursing sister taking the duty on the day.

Duty in Hospitals to which the Medical Officer is not attached.

16. In Hospitals where there is no medical officer attached, the senior nursing sister will be responsible for the management of the hospital, and will be permitted to use the hospital for the purpose of the hospital.

Day Duty.

17. When night duty is found necessary where there are no nursing sisters, the senior will still perform her administrative duties, and will be permitted to use the hospital for the purpose of the hospital.

18. Night duty will not be necessary except by the order of the medical officer in charge.

Uniform.

19. The following are the articles of uniform with which nursing sisters are required to provide themselves:-

- 8 overall (white).
- 4 dresses (white).
- 8 aprons.
- 8 caps (British Army pattern).
- 12 hand-down bowlers and cuffs (white lawn or linen).
- 3 belts (white).
- 3 helmets (white).
- Cotton stockings (white).
- Canvas shoes (white).
- 1 pair mosquito boots.
- 1 sun umbrella (white with green lining).
- 1 pair dark-tinted sun glasses.

The shoes worn by duty must have indiarubber heels. A sufficient number should be taken to nurse when necessary. It is suggested that for off duty and games nursing sisters should bring out washing frocks, white shirts and blouses. An evening frock or two would also prove useful.

APPENDIX D.

SPECIAL INFORMATION AS TO APPOINTMENTS IN THE NYASALAND PROTECTORATE

The nursing staff consists of a matron and seven nursing sisters. There are at present three Hospitals to which nursing sisters are posted for duty. In the Zomba Hospital the staff consists of the matron and two nursing sisters. In the Blantyre Hospital there are three nursing sisters. One nursing sister is posted to the Fort Johnston Hospital; occasionally assisting sisters are available for this duty.

All appointments are for a term of 12 months. The medical officer in charge of the hospital to which the nursing sister is appointed will be responsible for her conduct, and for the general management of the ward. East Africa.

We return herewith G.O. Papers M.A. 13466. We would explain that the Union Castle Suez boats have now ceased calling at Plymouth, but the British India homeward sailings occasionally put in there. The P. & O. boats regularly do so which affects Somaliland officers.

We note that the question of date of commencement of leave has raised the general question of expenses payable to East African officers in the country.

We note that in the case of first class officers it is recommended that no payment should be made for the journey home to ship and vice versa. We agree with this and shall be glad to have your official confirmation stating when it should come into force.

As you are aware, it is our present practice to pay expenses to ship on first appointment to second class officers, and further, in the case of all second class officers returning from leave we pay the railway fare from port to London to officers who have to proceed via London. We gather that it is now proposed to pay railway fares to all second class officers from home to ship and vice versa in every case. We see no reason why East African officers should receive this preferential treatment and we are not aware of any demand having been made for such payments. We should prefer that you authorise us to pay expenses to ship only to second class officers on first appointment and not to pay any expenses from ship. (Except special cases such as K.A.R. R.O.'s, etc).

This would have the effect of establishing a uniform procedure for all African Colonies and we shall be glad if

you/

you can see your way to sanction it.

We shall be glad to have your decision on this question of expenses and also in the point raised in the second paragraph of our minute of 18.3.21.
