
My dear Batterbee,

I have been worrying you so much on the telephone lately, that I think you will prefer my writing this note to you in continuation of the official letter that we sent you to-day on the subject of Robertson's staff for the Uasin-Gishu extension of the Uganda Railway.

I had a further conversation with him this morning, and he points out that in addition to the staff being a temporary one, and should therefore to some extent be paid rather more than permanent officials, he proposes that the suggested salaries should include all allowances such as travelling allowance, night allowance, etc., as he does not consider it is necessary to pay anything extra in the way of such allowances. We would also like the agreements to stipulate that for the three years during which the construction will proceed, none of the staff will receive any leave out of the Colony except on medical certificate, but that they should be

allowed to have one month's leave a year in the Colony. Should they however be prepared to forego their one month's leave a year during their term of service they should be given three month's leave at the termination of their agreement on full pay. I think this suggested arrangement seems to be excellent for this construction job. The country through which the railway is being constructed is very healthy, and three years I do not think is too long a time to expect a man to serve in such a place. If he likes to take his one month's leave a year, that is for him to settle, but if he likes to accumulate his leave, I think it would be only fair to let him have three months' on full pay at the termination of his agreement.

Sir,

I have the honour to inform you that we have now received from Colonel Robertson, the Chief Resident Engineer of the Uasin-Gishu extension of the Uganda Railway, his estimate for the construction of the line.

In this estimate, the following provision for the Government staff is set out :-

1 Deputy Resident Engineer at £1,200 per annum

1 Office Superintendent at £ 600 * *

2 European clerks at £ 400 * *

Typists at £ 250 * *

Draughtsmen at £ 500 * *

2 Asst. Resident Engineers at £ 800 * *

2 do. do. at £ 500 * *

3 Inspectors of Works at £ 400 * *

1 Bridge Inspector at £ 400 * *

Also the following staff for the Accountant's Office :-

1 Chief Accountant at £1,000 * *

1 Head Accountant at £ 600 * *

3 Accountant Clerks at £ 400 * *

2. These salaries are intended to be fixed salaries and Colonel Robertson suggests that no 50% allowance should be added to them while the officials are in the Kenya Colony.

3. We have carefully examined the rates of pay

proposed

The Under Secretary of State,

proposed and have compared them with the pay at present received by the permanent staff in the Colony. As far as we are able to judge, these rates have been calculated at the basic rate of the present permanent staff plus from 20% to 25% on that rate. We are, therefore of opinion that these rates are fair and reasonable.

4. We understand that the Governor is quite sympathetic to the principle that the 50% should not be added to any of the staff of this Railway extension, and we have therefore the honour to request the Secretary of State's sanction to engage the above staff at the salaries proposed, as and when required.
