My Excellency:-

Monsieur de St. Amaire,
French Ambassador.

By his note of the 8th January last Monsieur de Fleuriau was good enough to inform His Majesty's Government of several measures of the Kenya Government which, in the opinion of the French Government, violated certain provisions of the Treaty between France and Mombat of the 17th November 1914. The note under referred to states that the measures in question are the Traders Licensing Ordinance August 1919, an income tax ordinance and a land tax and land transfer tax bill.

I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that, on making further enquiries on this matter, I find that the land tax and land transfer tax bills, as originally framed have now been dropped, and that a modified land tax bill is under consideration, though it is impossible to say at present whether this Bill in its modified form will be passed or not.

3. As regards the Traders Licensing Ordinance, His Majesty's Government hold the view that Article 11 of the Treaty of 1914, to which reference is made in paragraph 3 of Monsieur de Fleuriau's note,

merely confers the right to buy and sell within the Sultan's Dominions such as is enjoyed by Zahrishar subjects unimpeded by "tous les moyens ou priviléges exclusifs de vents ou d'achats", but that it does not prevent the passing legislation regulating the manner in which that right should be exercised provided that such legislation applies equally to all persons trading in no preference is given to any particular class or nation, and serves the general interest of the country.

it is not imagined that the French Government would, on account of this provision, admit that such persons are exempt from any legislation in regard to these matters that may be generally imposed.

4. As regards the question of the Income Tax and the Land Tax (if it be finally decided to impose a tax of this nature) I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that His Majesty's Government are not able to admit that Article 11 of the Pago-Muscat Treaty can properly be held to preclude the imposition of such taxes, since they regard that Article as clearly referring only to taxation upon commercial operations.

I am etc. to acknowledge the receipt of your letter (No.A/2603/248/60) of the 29th April, relative to a complaint of the French Government as to the alleged violation of French treaty rights by the Kenya Government, and to state, for the information of Earl Curzon of Kedleston, that Mr. Churchill concurs in the terms of the reply which Lord Curzon proposes to return to the French Ambassador.

2. The observation contained in paragraph 3 of the Draft Note was not intended for communication to the French Government, but Mr. Churchill sees no objection to its inclusion in the Note if Lord Curzon sees no objection to it, I am etc.
