

ITALIAN EMBASSY.

The Italian Ambassador presents his compliments to the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs and has the honor to request his favorable consideration of the fact that it is very necessary - in view of the close relations between their respective governments - that the most intimate and cordial relations should subsist between British and Italian authorities. He wishes to facilitate the transfer of Jubaland. While this settlement is effect, however, the Italian authorities in Ethiopia, it was thought, would consider the transfer of the territory to Italy in the same state of tranquillity and the same, the same numerical position of its inhabitants, as existed in that territory at the time when the British Government first resolved to cede it to Italy.

The Italian Government feels assured that the English Government will willingly and speedily give the necessary instructions to the competent local authorities, in order that their actions might be entirely inspired by sentiments of cordial co-operation with the Italian authorities.

In regard to the same matter, Mr. de Martino desires to draw the particular attention of Earl Curzon of Kedleston to the fact of the removal of British garrisons from Jubaland. This has been effected contrary to the arrangements which have hitherto obtained and which provided for mutual and entire agreement

between the two Colonial Governments in regard to the  
commencement of the evacuation by British troops and  
the substitution of Italian for British garrisons.

Mr. de Martine therefore begs to request Earl  
Curzon of Kedleston to telegraph the necessary orders  
to the Government at Nairobi, in order that the said  
removal of garrisons might be suspended immediately,  
and likewise to be so good as to order that the local  
authorities in Jubaland should assume the responsibility  
of maintaining order until such time as the Italian  
Government shall be in a position to begin the  
removal of its troops.
