Secretary State authorised payment Kisii claims  
basis recommendation of compensation commission.

Government paying European claim in full offering Indians  
after declining any liability on Government part only as  
grace fifteen per cent on Rs.232314 as passed by commissi  
out of total claims of 268536 Indians refusing payment.

Associated Chamber Commerce wired Secretary State  
supporting Indians claim for full payment protesting  
against composition and findings of commission.

Commission was composed of two Government officials only  
and no commercial representation European or Indian.  
Commissions report and findings submitted 6th January  
1916 to Governor kept strictly secret by Government up to  
now hence no objections before represent Colonial India  
Offices Savile President Kisumu Chamber now in England  
also representing. Indian claimants all in debt paying  
interest for last seven years Government decision will  
lead to wholesale bankruptcy. Request Secretary State  
wire here pay Indians in full Rupees 232314 final figures  
accepted by commission.
