CURRENCY

Fwds telegram from Lord Delamere, officially representing the producers of Kenya and requests that arrangements may be made at a very early date for reception of a deputation representing all concerned in production including missionaries.

Sir H. Read,

This letter was left with me yesterday by Lord Cranworth, Major Crowdy and Mr. Jowers. It was an application for an interview with the Secretary of State, but up to now deputations on currency questions have been received by Colonel Amery. I understand that Colonel Amery would prefer that deputations should be postponed until we have the report of the local Committee which is considering the details of the future currency of the country, or that, alternatively, the various interests which are involved and are represented in London should meet together in order to come to some joint arrangement acceptable to all which could be put before the office for acceptance.

When the letter was handed to me, the line was taken that the telegram came after the recent discussion in the Legislative Council when it was decided that the

Florin should remain at 2/- but that the Committee to be appointed should consider other details. That is to say, Lord Delamere was represented as accepting the 2/- rate of the Florin but pressing for a coin of lower denomination for common use, e.g. in the payment of native wages. I was unable at the time to say whether this view was tenable or not, but I now find that the telegram is identical with that of which Major Grogan has already sent us a copy and which is there described as "dated Nairobi February 5th received 10th." That settles the question of what Lord Delamere's views were; the telegram dates from the time when the agitation of the reduction of the Florin to 2/- was in progress.

Until we receive the recommendations of the local Committee we must necessarily mark time and the only question is in what manner we should receive expressions of opinion here for consideration when the local recommendations are received.

In view of the chaos at present existing in East Africa, and of the fact that the Committee appointed by the Legislative Council at Nairobi have been instructed to report at an early date, I am to urge that no decision be arrived at without consultation with the Producers upon whom every other interest in the country is ultimately dependent, and that arrangements for the reception of the deputation by the Secretary of State be made at a very early date.

The Seaman's Hospital Society has arranged special facilities for the treatment of officers of the Colonial and similar services in private wards at the Dreadnought Hospital, Greenwich at the following reduced rates:-

Each patient will pay a standard ward charge of 10/6d per day, which will cover all maintenance costs, including nursing medicines, and surgical dressings, and the attendance of the resident medical officer attached to the ward.

In addition, for the services of the honorary visiting staff, fees will be based on the income of the patient, according to the following table (1).

Grade A.	£700 - £1,000.
Grade B.	£500 - £ 700.
Grade C.	£300 - £ 500.

In Medical cases the fees charged will be:-

Grade A3	guineas	for 1st & 2	guineas	each	subsequent	visit.
"	B....2	"	"	1st & 1½	"	"	"
"	C....2	"	"	1st & 1	guinea	"	"

with the proviso in each case that not more than two visits will be charged for in any one week and that the total fees will not exceed the maximum as shown in Table 11.

In Surgical cases the fees will be as above.

Dental and X Ray examinations will be carried out at similar rates.

Bacteriological examinations will be charged for at the standard rates obtaining in public laboratories.

**Payments of Colonial Office Patients
and others.**

Extract from Medical Council Minutes 14th December 1926.

Dr. Sundell and Mr. Rowntree submitted a Memorandum containing their suggestions for payments to the Medical in respect of Colonial Office patients. The memorandum was fully discussed and subject to a few minor corrections was adopted. The Memorandum as adopted, was as follows:-

COLONIAL OFFICE AGREEMENT.

The Seaman's Hospital Society has arranged special facilities for the treatment of officers of the Colonial and similar services in private wards at the Dreadnought Hospital, Greenwich at the following reduced rates:-

Each patient will pay a standard ward charge of 10/6 per day, which will cover all maintenance costs, including nursing, medicines, and surgical dressings, and the attendance of a resident medical officer attached to the ward.

In addition, for the services of the honorary visiting staff, fees will be based on the income of the patient, according to the following table (1).

Grade A.	£700 - £1,000.
Grade B.	£500 - £ 700.
Grade C.	£300 - £ 500.

In Medical cases the fees charged will be:-

Grade A...	3 guineas for 1st & 2 guineas each subsequent visit
" B....2	" " 1st & 1½ " "
" C....2	" " 1st & 1 guinea " "
