I am directed by the East African
Section of this Chamber, and the East African
Section of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce,
with the assent of the Liverpool Chamber of
Commerce, to ask the favour of the considera-
tion by the Secretary of State of a proposal
to the effect that a Joint East African Com-
mittee (comprising the three Chambers) should
be formed on similar lines and for similar pur-
poses, to the Joint West Africa Committee formed
in 1908 with the approval of the late Rt. Hon.
Jesbon Chamberlain.

The Secretary of State will be aware
that the meetings of this Committee have two ob-
jects, (i) to provide a means whereby the views of
the Chambers may be stated and discussed with
the Colonial Office with greater frankness than
would be the case by correspondence. Meetings of
the Joint West Africa Committee are almost periodi-
cally held at the Colonial Office, and on such
occasions the chair is usually taken either by the
Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State or by a
Permanent Under Secretary. At these meetings the
number of delegates from each Chamber is limited
to four, and the number of subjects to be discussed
is limited to six, and no subjects may be brought
forward upon which the three Chambers have not

agreed upon the proposals to be submitted or the views to be expressed.

The proposed Joint East African Committee of the three Chambers if formed would desire to be afforded similar facilities for conferring with the Colonial Office, and it is this suggestion which it is hoped will receive the early and sympathetic consideration of the Secretary of State.

(2). The Committee, in addition, would be able to meet and discuss among themselves all or any subjects, and indeed the suggestion that a joint organization under the auspices of the Manchester and London Chambers emanated from the Chairman of the Imperial Shipping Committee on the occasion of a recent conference held in regard to East African Shipping Conditions.

It is submitted that such a Committee if afforded the desired facilities, could usefully assist in the determination of matters affecting Commerce, Trade and Industry, and the development of Transport, Dock and Railway facilities, the method and incidence of taxation and questions affecting the mixed population of the territories concerned.
