East Africa Protectorate.  
Lease of Land at Limuru.

By an Indenture of Lease for 99 years dated 31st May, 1915, the Crown Agents demised to our Clients, The East African Estates Limited, about 2,000 acres of land at Limuru for the purpose of a bacon factory and raising of pigs, etc.

On the 4th June, 1919, this Lease was assigned by The East African Estates Limited to The British Colonial Provisions Company Limited which was formed for the purpose of carrying on this bacon industry.

His Excellency the Governor of The East Africa Protectorate has now approved the grant of an open Lease for 999 years direct to The British Colonial Provisions Company Limited. If the matter is carried out in the Protectorate it will be necessary to have the existing Title stamped and registered in that country and this will mean a payment of ad valorem duty of 2 per cent on the consideration mentioned in the Assignment of the 4th June, 1919. It has, therefore, been suggested that the Lease of the 31st May, 1915, should be surrendered in this country, and on advice from the Colonial Office that the surrender has been completed, the Land The Under Secretary of State for the Colonies.

Department will issue a new Lease under the Registration of Titles Ordinance 1919. We enclose two Letters from the Principal Registrar of Crown Lands, dated the 23rd October, 1920, and the 26th May, 1921, together with duplicates for your use, which confirm this. We shall be much obliged if you will let us have the originals back in due course. We would point out that the Assignment of the 4th June, 1919, already bears ad valorem stamp of 25s. the consideration of the Assignment of , Lease inserted in the Deed being 26583. 191 S. Our Clients naturally want to save having to pay ad valorem stamp duty twice over if the surrender takes place in the Protectorate, and in view of the fact that they have already paid ad valorem duty we trust that the Colonial Office will agree to the matter being carried out in the way suggested.

The documents of Title can be sent down for perusal if desired.

In Re 2000 Acres Limuru District.

Referring to your letter of 15th ult. herein, I have to advise you that His Excellency has approved the grant of an open lease for 999 years under the Crown Lands Ordinance, 1915, which, as no doubt you are aware, provides for a rent of 10 cents per acre.

2. It will be necessary to execute a surrender of the existing title, which, I may mention, does not appear to have been stamped and registered in this country.

3. I shall be glad to know if your Company will accept the new grant under the Registration of Titles Ordinance, 1919 (Torrens).

Sir,

In Re Conversion of Title.

With reference to your letter of 22nd inst.. I have no objection to the course proposed, provided it is understood that the new title cannot be issued until I am advised by the Colonial Office that the surrender has been completed, and that this Department cannot accept any responsibility for consequent delay.

2. The only alternative is to produce the documents of title for surrender locally, in which case, however, I should be compelled to collect stamp duty on the lease and subsequent assignment since, as already pointed out in my 7188 of 23rd October last, these documents do not appear to have been stamped and registered in this country.

3. Beyond this no advantage appears to be offered by the course suggested, though you are in a better position to judge from the amount of stamp duty that would be payable if the deeds are reproduced. And in this connection I would mention that the duty on the lease would be negligible while on the assignment it would amount to approximately 2% on the consideration expressed in the deed.

4. I shall be glad to hear further at your convenience.
