The intention is that:

- (a) Our Land Office work does not require senior men, and Mr. J. V. Lunn should be dispensed with.
- (b) Survey work can largely be entrusted to private (licensed) surveyors, whose fees will be recoverable from the people for whom surveys are done. An STANHILL's Government staff will be kept, so as that the work is accurate, and the advantages of the excellent system of cadastral survey drafting up by Mr. DRAKE, Director of Land Survey, may be lost.

The work of executive, civil, or Chancery, Arab, Madiun, and Kano, can best be completed by Administrators and Clerks of the Civil Service, as was agreed in Mr. Hart's letter.

The difficulty, regarding all such cases, is the disposal of redundant officers.

(a) The three Assistant Land Officers hold pensionable appointments and the Governor suggests that they should be transferred. The matter has been referred to the Promotions Department, but I do not suppose there is much chance, and we must face the prospect of pensions.

(b) Survey Staff. Last summer the Governors of Uganda and Kenya put forward proposals for increases in salaries and the number of pensionable posts. These have been with me for five months because

(i) I saw difficulty with regard to the increased salaries, both because of the need for economy and because they involve considerations of house and travelling allowances which have given such trouble in the past.

part; and

(ii) Kenya's recommendations for pensionable appointments were too sweeping altogether, especially as the Director of Land Surveys a year before had told me that he saw no need for pensionable appts.; I did not believe when I saw the proposals that so many posts could be permanently required, and the result has justified my doubt if not my hesitation.

Of the Field Staff, 16 were to be pensionable, namely, the five now to be retrenched, Woodruff, O'Moloney, Ramsey, Marango and Bessler; and eleven others who are presumably to form part of the examining staff to be retained.

Thirteen Field surveyors were left unpensionable, and these must be presumed to include the "12 temporary surveyors" who are to be retrenched but "who may prefer transfer to local practice". Mr. Stephenson, in his minute annexed, sees little prospect for them. Their case presents no greater difficulty than is inseparable from the retrenchment of temporary staff.

The case of the five named above requires special consideration. They are not actually pensionable, and it is clear from Mr. Martin's letter that, if he had been in Kenya at the time when the proposals were sent home, he would have been unable to certify that these posts would be permanently required. Unless it is found that some sort of pledge was given to them locally, I consider that they must be treated in the same way as the other temporary officers.

One of them, however, Woodruff, is a subject for special sympathy, as he has been invalided for locomotor ataxy and we have to decide before the end of February what to do for him. In a separate telegram on this point the Governor has referred to last year's proposal to make him pensionable and has an alternative agreed to a liberal extension of leave. I suppose that Mr. Woodruff may live for many years, but that the chance of his being able to earn anything are very slight. He has 15 years Kenya service and his pension would be about £250 a year. We could perhaps distinguish his case from the others.

by reason of his inability to work, and tell the Governor that he may, if he wishes, propose to the Legislative Council a vote of a special pension provided that it is not made a precedent for similar treatment in the other cases.

(Mr. Woodruff had earlier Uganda service, but there was a break, and there is therefore no question of a pension from Uganda, with the consequent necessity for reference to the Treasury)

(c) The Recorder of Titles gives no difficulty. He is a seconded officer of the Administration, and if he is not wanted back he is eligible for pension by reason of length of service. In any case, the Governor is writing as to him)

 practice. Annual saying £27,000 despatch follows but  
 desire you will sanction provisionally by telegram in  
 order to give notice to all concerned. Recommendation  
 as to McLean present Recorder will follow.

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

Dear Batterbee

some time soon you will  
probably see what at first sight may appear  
somewhat alarmist proposals put forward  
by myself for the reduction of my one major  
vote. They are neither hasty conceived nor,  
I think, inopportune. During the past 2½ years,  
within which period I have been trying  
out the experiment of an amalgamated  
Dept (including the old Land Office + Survey  
+ Registration + the Registry of Court Titles  
+ Mines (1)), we have been faced with a real

mass of work extraordinary: Soldier Settlement, the resurveying of the past 100+ years allotments, & the putting into motion of the new Forest Registration Law throughout the country. During that period while it was not possible to make any considerable reduction of staff our expense funded the reverse as regards expenses which is however all recoverable) & there has been within my <sup>cumulative</sup> period the same scheme for ultimate economy. Now that I have returned I find the Soldier Settlement entirely complete this month, & the work well in hand: I also find a very considerable financial stringency. Now as regards the office

or reorganized: the particular Land Office members Campbell, McLean & Cotton have been too long in the Dept. & would be better for a change: there will be no distribution quite equal amongst the offices of the State. As regards the surveyors we are keeping a sufficient force & reasonable men, & for special need of the public, the public must pay for the employment of private practitioners under our supervision. As regards the Records of Land Titles, the Court of the Recorders has lagged on for 12 years at an annual dead loss of between £10-20,000.

In our opinion, a man speaks far more about  
the value of justice and settlement and the  
Holland Law that the work should have been  
completed you go to the application of all  
the local District officers, who are engaged  
in Recorders, & that is the more I happen  
to write now, as it is difficult & important  
cases will also go through the court of  
first instance & the Higher Court, but the  
earlier majority of such cases are settled  
of that nature.

given me the chance I have been wanting for  
ever since I took up this job, of putting  
my house in sumptuous approaching decent order.

TELEGRAM: From the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor of Kenya.

(Sent 11.10 a.m. 8th February 1932)

8th February.

Your telegram 21st January twenty-three Land Office proposals approved generally. Little prospect of transfer of Alexander Campbell Cotter or of twelve temporary surveyors. Subject to above provide officers recommended for pensionable status your despatch 2nd July should be treated like other temporary officers subject to any promises of permanent employment that may have been made in any individual cases. Woodruff sees your telegram 30th January requires special consideration and you may if you wish ~~for~~ Legislative Council vote of special pension on ground of prospective inability to earn living provided that it is not made precedent for similar treatment in the other cases. He will be granted extension of leave pending reply.
