Sir,

With reference to my Confidential despatch of the 15th of May last on the subject of correspondence between Harry Thuku and a native of this Protectorate named Kamulegeya, employed in the Provincial Commissioner's Office at Kampala, I have the honour to inform you that enquiries have elicited the following information.

2. Kamulegeya was at one time Honorary Secretary of the Young Baganda Association, and it was probably in this capacity that he communicated with Harry Thuku. The Young Baganda Association is professedly a well conducted society of young men who aim at furthering the social, political and industrial development of the Baganda by legitimate and constitutional methods.

3. Kamulegeya is the son of an eccentric, but not disloyal, county chief of Buganda, and his brother is at present being educated at the Booker Washington College at Tuskegee. Kamulegeya is no doubt in correspondence with his brother, and possibly with representatives of the Universal Negro Improvement Association.

4. There is, however, no evidence that either Kamulegeya or the Young Baganda Association are engaged in seditious propaganda, and there would
