

afraid this is rather a long rambling sort of letter, but I'm just trying to give you a line of what I have done, and it strikes me that I ought to be with my experience and record, a useful member of the community who ought to be doing more for the country than running a few chickens. I have always since I was a boy at home had to handle labour and during the last eighteen months have had the opportunity of discussing the English question with all classes of people. There is one thing certain, nothing can successfully be done in England without sound finance. Some things may be done through a Government Guarantee through the banking system, but the Government takes it must be charged away in some way. In many cases the Government has to guarantee the land. A farmer is never any better off than he is providing he is under a Government landlord. Owning his own land anyway is a great advantage. I have taken in hand very shortly the business of writing. It was anything I could do at the present time. I have undertaken in life, whether right or wrong, I have always done with the object of making a job of work worth having. I have never worked for others with the exception of my father and the army and have had a fairly large experience of labour and have always found I could get at them, so that they made their work a pleasure rather than a task, and it struck me that with my experience I could again become a useful member of the community. I have lost my African estates but no one can say I made a failure of my work out there, when one's estates can be sold on a more or less forced sale to realise 20/- in the pound, and my record in Kenya will stand investigation by anyone. You know a little of my private affairs, which have in a great measure been the cause of my losing everything, that and having no one directly

to be away. I'm afraid I have been too independent -
and liked to do things on my own, as you know I have
always taken a great interest in finance and can say
that I know what farmers and many others are up against and
there may be something somewhere that I can do good work
