Sir,

I have the honour to confirm my telegram No. 194 of the 9th June reading as follows:-

1. My despatch 24th March No. 374 - In view of need for economy regret must retrench Coxon now on leave. Please inform him if approved.

recommend him for transfer. Request sanction retrench for same reason also following five Administrative Cadets viz. Iwong, Lecheni Webber, Boyd and Lowder. Should be glad of your reply. Despatch follows.

2. Certain suggestions for retrenchment in the staff of the Administration Branch, including personal staff and that of the Secretary and Chief Native Commissioner's Office, beginning submitted to me by the Economic and Finance Department, your despatch of 18th June is now sitting to consider means for reducing department expenditure.

3. I have given close consideration to these proposals and have arrived at the conclusion that these proposals for reductions in the Administrative Staff are possible in certain specified districts so as to give the following result:-

The allocation of this staff is clearly set out in the attached schedule, with regard to which I have to make -

the following observations:-

Secretariat. In lieu of the Junior Assistant Secretary and one European Clerk, I have provisionally appointed to act as an Establishment Officer the present Office Superintendent, Mr. G. W. Knappman. I have approved that this post at £500 by £25 to £600 may be inserted for consideration in the 1923 Estimates. This Officer deals with all Statistics and Returns required by and from the Secretariat as well as with all personal matters such as applications for leave, appointments and inquiries regarding ex-servants. The post of Establishment Officer is, however, not shewn on the schedule as it is special. My appointment will be given in my

Clerk of Councils. This is another special post not shewn on the schedule; it is proposed to retrench this post upon the termination of the "vacation" leave of the holder, Mr. H. Malpass, and to divide his duties among the remaining staff in the Secretariat and at Government House.

Chief Native Commissioner's Section. The remaining two 1st Grade posts are the Principal Inspector of Labour and the Chief Registrar of Natives; the latter will be able, with the assistance of the Junior Assistant to combine with his duties the clerical and statistical work which it was intended should be performed by the Senior Inspector of Labour, this post being retrenched. The four 2nd Grade posts are for three Labour Inspectors and one Junior Assistant. I have always been of opinion that Labour Inspection can best be carried out by officers who have had practical experience of Native administration and of the habits and customs of Africans in their own Reserves. My proposal, therefore, is to abolish the posts of Labour Inspector as such, equally increasing -

increasing the number of 2nd Grade Administrative posts, and attaching three Administrative Officers to the Principal Inspector of Labour for this work. With this I trust that you will agree. The two present holders, Messrs. Galway and Shields, will be absorbed into other posts as opportunity offers.

With regard to the Junior Assistant for the Chief Native Commissioner, in your despatch Confidential of 5th January, 1922, you were unable to allow the appointment of a Personal Assistant to the Chief Native Commissioner. Experience, however, shows that the Deputy Chief Native Commissioner or his Agent in the Native Council in the Native Commissioner's Department and Special Commissioned Officers handle a much larger volume of correspondence than without a junior and can easily get correspondence draft ready as they attend to many other matters such as the collection and compilation of statistics, &c., & are unable to regard the post office related business for efficiency.

Administrative. - As soon as the desired reduction, whilst allowing for the filling of vacancies which it is known will eventuate by the end of next year, it is desirable to take immediate steps to retrench some of the Cadets.

4. I have carefully considered the Progress Reports of all Cadets and am of opinion that steps should be taken to retrench the six officers named in my telegram above quoted. I wish, however, to make it clear that it is only the need for retrenchment that leads me to recommend the termination of the appointments of certain of these officers. In the case of the first named, Mr. Coxon, whose only defect is that he is reported to

be "not very brilliant mentally and perhaps still suffering from shell-shock." I trust that it will be possible to find other employment for him, as he is undoubtedly hardworking and conscientious and accords very well with natives.

Major J. O'Brien-Twohig has been under particular pressure since August last when it was necessary for me to warn him that certain untruthful statements had come to the notice of Government which he claimed to have made to the Royal Ulster Legion T.D., the Legion T.D. who had been present at various meetings. I consider the gravity of his offence and the probability of his being tried for perjury. However, in view of the essential need for truthfulness in dealing with natives, I cannot recommend him for any such post although his energy and keenness deserve that he be considered for other Government employment if a suitable vacancy occurs.

On virgin hills there is a lack of sympathy among the natives and the native will not consider the advice of the Native Administration. I am unable to find his re-employment in another suitable post.

Mr. R. L. Webber's work is characterised by lack of interest, and it is for this reason that I have selected him for retrenchment. I recommend him for further trial in another Crown Colony.

Mr. Boyd's reports shew him to be an officer of no particular merit or demerit; I have selected him for retrenchment rather than the four officers junior to him in that those latter have all received high praise

from the District Commissioners under whom they have been serving, whereas Mr. Boyd's report can best be described as "negative". I recommend him for an appointment in another Crown Colony.

Mr. Lowden put forward for retrenchment on the ground that "ceteris paribus", it is fair that the most junior should go; a good report has been received on his work and he is recommended for his present employment elsewhere.
