It is unfortunate we have had no fuller expression of the Governor's opinion on this important proposal than is contained in Sir C.Bowring's despatch asking for approval to the expenditur paragraph 3.

With regard to the objects of the Publicity Office, as explained in the enclosure, there can be no doubt that the main object is, as stated, to attract population and capital. The Colony generally wants the capital and the "Diehards" are, according to all accounts, anxious to increase the European element in order to strengthen their hands in the Indian controversy. In addition, there

is the suspicion bound to attach to
the Land Settlement Committee Scheme
(35.2.
(see below) that those who most desire
to attract pupulation are those with
land which they wish to unload on to
new settlers.

From the point of view of giving information regarding Kenya to enquirers, I suppose we must admit that the present arrangements are too divided to be altogether satis-The Colonial Office deals factory. with such enquiries as it ean. Crown Agents also answer enquiries for sale: the Oversea Settlement Office deals with enquiries as to the prospects of settlers and the Department of Overseas Trade answers commercial enquiries, from the information given to them either by us or by the Trade Commissioner's office in This multiplication of East Africa. effort might possibly be improved on by the establishment of one central bureau, but it at all events has the advantage that none of the agencies concerned can be suspected of any ulterior motive.

I am afraid that the Kenya
Office, under a Chief imbued with
local influence and the plausibility which one expects of a propagandist lecturer, would not command for

long any reputation for impartial The phrase "to assist in popularising the products of Kenya". and the idea of a headquarters in a big thoroughfare, in which Kenya produce would be displayed, show that the intention of the office is distinctly in the direction of a shop window. I am completely. sceptical as to the usefulness of a shop window which could not possibly rival the displays of the big selfgoverning Dominions, and I think it is to be regretted that if Kenya must have an agency, they do not rather go for a modest office, where, in addition to answering enquiries, contact would be established with the big communing houses in this country, whom it is far more important/to attract to the use of Kenya products than any number of street loungers.

In minuting on the Land
Settlement Advisory Committee papers,
Mr. Ormsby Gore has expressed the
view that encouragement of further
immigration should not be allowed
until the Indian programme is settled;
and it seems to me impossible that we
should, in the circumstances, accept
immediately this proposal, which has
for its main intention, the attraction
of new settlers. Further, it is not
desirable until (in about three weeks)

we receive the Kenya Estimates for 1923, and know more of the financial position, that we should sign away light-heartedly £8,000 of the Colony's revenue after we have agreed throughout 1922, with a steadily increasing reluctance, to the retrenchment of valuable offices in the service of the Colony.

I think we should telegraph that the Secretary of State must suspend judgment until we receive the estimates. First that in any case he is doubtful whether an office, the main object of which would be to advertise the attractions of Kenya at a time when the position of settlers already there is at Its worst, would be justified, and whether a display of Kenya products in close proximity to the more imposing displays of self-governing Dominions would not be likely to defeat its own object.

I have the honour to submit for consideration the Report of the Committee appointed to "sonsider and report on the advisability of opening a Government Publicity Office in London on January 1st,1923, and to take detailed recommendations on any scheme they may advise f sontion".

The Committee of the Rt. Hon. Lord Delaiere, the Hon. Lir. E. Powys the Hon. Capt. J.E. Coney, the Hon. H.F. Ward, the Hon. Manager, Uganda Railway, the Hon. Commissioner of the Hon Ag. Director of Agriculture (Chairman)

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And following are the conclusions arrived at:
Add the The Committee was unanisous as to the necessity

and acceptable to the an Office being established.

Ite objects we've defined as follows:-

do: Dr attract population and capital.

To render impersonal and general advice to all enquirers desiring information regarding the Colony and Protectorate.

To assist in popularising the products of acays. The means by which it is recommended these objects may be achieved are:

- (L) A Headquerters in London, situated in a contral position such as Kingsway, Aldwoh, Piccadilly, with opportunities for display.
 - (II) By the dissemination of information regarding the potentialities and achievements of the Colony as regards Agriculture, Settlement, Development of all areas, and other openings, Mative Areas, Development and Industries.
 - (III) By the explanation of the facilities offered by the Government and the Uganda Railway. Explanation of Gustons,

(IV) By the display of the produce of tenys in an attractive form by exhibitions at suitable opportunities, press propagands work and advertising, lectures at Schools, Agricultural Colleges and Universities.

Organisation Meeded. It is recommended that this be a separate Department of Government corresponding direct with Government for the reason that it will deal with so many Departments, viz Railway, Native Affairs Department, Administration, Forestry, Agriculture and Lads.

It is recommended that a Local Advisory Board should be appointed in Kenya for the purpose of advising the London Office of any changes in the position in Kenya which might have an influence on advise and so forth, also to keep the Office supplied with information and material, it is suggested that this Board should consist of the Heads of different Departments concerned, elected combers of Council and two newspaper representatives.

The Committee recommends that a Chief with an Assistant and cherical assistance be appointed to be demiciled in London. The Chief should spend at least one month of each year in Kenya in order that he may refresh his memory and keep in touch with the conditions existing in, and the progress achieved by the Colony.
