With reference to paragraph 4 of your minutes to dis Excellency sent under your Sc. 21787/7/1/10 of the 4th instant, I am strongly opposed to the suggestion that the Railway is liable for payment of Interest on the sum of memory locked up in its Unallocated Stores.

- 2. Prior to 1916 the Unallocated Stores were financed from the outstanding balances of the original grant for the construction of the Railway but it then because necessary that the money so utilized should be available for expital expenditure, and in consequence the original grant was reinbursed from Protectorate surplus balances with the result that the balance of Stores because morged into the the Protectorate Statement of Assets and Liebilities.
- 3. Since the line was spened for rublic traffic, severer, sens A2,370,000 met earnings of the Railway have been handed ever to the general research of the Chiang and but for the fact that it had rece to the possible and convenient to finance the Stores from the existent Capital Grant, there is little doubt that the Balance of Stores would have been gradually built up from surplus research. On this ground alone I content that the bullance of Etarge unould be handed ever to the Railway free of charge.
- 4. I further submit that a working belance of Stores is just as much an indispensable and integral portion of the line as, for instance, as Lake Figteria Nyanna Pictilla which during this same period has been built up from Revenue carnings.
