Your Excellency,

With reference to your note of November 11th last (2/11/3) respecting the question of the grant of customs facilities to the Italian Consul at Nairobi, I have the honour to enquire whether this official is a consul de carriers.

Article 8 of the Preliminary Provisions of the Italian Customs Tariff of July 1st, 1921, lays down that:-

"Effects and furniture of first installations belonging to foreign Consuls subject to the proviso contained in the preceding article [e.g. provided that reciprocity be granted by their government] shall be exempt from import and export duties.

This exemption shall not apply to articles of consumption, such as colonial produce, goods forming a monopoly wines, liqueurs, and the like.

Provided reciprocity exists, there shall also be exempted on entry of uniforms of Foreign Consuls, as well as on flags, escutcheons,

stationery goods, including furniture for keeping same, safes, writing materials which foreign governments transmit to their respective Consuls in Italy for the use of the offices of the Consulate".

It would thus appear that the same rule applies to the writer's as to stationery, and His Majesty's Consul General at Milan and Naples say that stationery is regularly admitted free of duty. As shown it is a question of reciprocity.

It is advisable, in such cases, for the Consul receiving goods of this description to notify the Customs before the arrival of the goods as this expedites their clearance.

directed by the Marquess Curzon of Kedleston to observe
that unless Mr. Secretary Churchill sees special reason for
pursuing the matter further, His Lordship is disposed to
think it would be preferable to avoid action which might
revive the request made by the Italian Ambassador in his
note of November 11th, 1920, inasmuch as the question of
the extension of the wider consular exemptions formerly
accorded to a few foreign countries appears likely to
rise to difficulties.
