I should be much obliged if you would kindly cancel my  
previous letter or my last and substitute this one.

I have to thank you for Mr. Grindale's letter of the 25th January, and for the opportunity it gives me of replying to his letter of the 15th February, 1913. He says in his letter that he gives, founded on his own experience with regard to the training of Elephants, his opinion if appreciated such work would, in my view, be a minor part of our operations which would be principally concentrated on the exportation of pathological specimens and on the breeding and exportation of blood.

For the purpose of collecting and importing animals to different zoological gardens throughout the world we require:

1. The rights of capturing animals, birds and reptiles anywhere in British East Africa.
2. That we should be granted the right of using ~~the~~ Asagoniak's game farm at Moshi near Kilimanjaro. This must include at least 3,000 acres of land for feeding purposes.
3. That we be granted the ~~the~~ rights of 5,000 acres in the highlands of Kia for a game reserve to breed animals and experiment.

To establish the Island Farm on the basis suggested I believe we should require the following:

1. The ~~the~~ rights of 10,000 acres of land to be increased after two years to 20,000 if the enterprise proves successful (at least 10 acres of land will be required to feed the beast). We shall require the rights of purchasing this land from the Government, a 'Concession' being given.

The rights of capturing land in E.A. for stocking the farm apart from individual animals sent out of the country to Zanzibar. We stipulate the shooting of land should be prohibited or very greatly restricted during the experimental stage.

For the Island Farm we should like land near London and elsewhere, as this country is free from 'ticks'.

We should be prepared to pay an import duty of 5% on the value of each animal in E.A. before we are prepared to spend from £10,000 to £15,000 on the Island Farm within the next four years. We guarantee that no shooting will be done by employees of the Company other than in self defence or without the employee having a proper license. We do not intend to shoot or capture Elephants for Ivory.
