Further letter from the Commissioner of Lands
dated 15th June 1902 (Enc. No. 2/1117)
notifying Mrs. Payne info. also, and that as neither
she herself nor an ex-Soldier Manager has occupied the land
for six months during the first three years subsequent to
October 2nd 1901, the farm was liable to forfeiture.

In answer to their communication Mr. Payne pointed
out that his Medical advisors still prohibited her use
and from taking the journey to British East Africa, also
stating that she had not hitherto been aware that the
conditions of illness permitted the appointment of an
Ex-Service Manager as her representative, but that she
would at once attempt to find a suitable manager to
place in charge if the Mairpol authorities would agree to
this being done.


The Commissioner of Lands at Mairpol rep. on
September 1st, 1902 granting a further extension of her
sovereign's forfeiture or farm provided a Medical
Certificates of Health for Mr. Payne were supplied and
gave no definite reply as to the longer duration of the
Ex-Service Manager until a response.

Mr. Payne in consequence sent the Medical certificates
and, offering letter, before the specific question was
settled, appointed an Ex-Soldier Manager that deceased Mairpol
on the 21st January 1903 February 3rd 1903, the date of
signing of the last document of which dictated 1902 to
be the date of his appointment.

On 1st April 1903 Mairpol received a copy of
a general regulation for the disposal of
the British East African Dependencies issued by
the Colonial Office, 1st October 1902, concerning the
disposal of the former possessions of the
Sultan of Zanzibar, and it was to be observed that
it contained a clause to the effect that

any authority to administer the property
intends to assume the position of the authority of the
Colonial Office until such time as a representative can be
appointed a reply, or another official writing has been made.

As Women's Branch of the Overseas Settlement Committee the above Society has been consulted by Mrs. Bayne of Spring Park, Surrey upon the following matter.

Mrs. Bayne, late Woman Inspector under the Woman's Branch of the Ministry of Agriculture, applied in September 1919 for grant of land in Kenya Colony under the Land Settlement scheme, and was allotted holding in the Lumbwa district in February 1920 which date her appointment at the Ministry of Agriculture terminated.

One of the conditions attaching to the allotment was that the owner should enter into possession of his allotment. But finding that her husband would not permit him to travel to Kenya, Mrs. Bayne wrote to the Land Department in September 1921 and asked for an exemption from fulfilling the required extension of time for entering the required extension of time for
