The Secretary of State has received a Memorandum to the Overseas Settlement Committee concerning their observations. The Committee have been in full agreement regarding the British East African Officers' Colony and are less able to give future prospects than the Colonial Office. They have no news of that Office on these points.

That the proposed assistance to the British East African Disabled Officers' Colony falls within the purview of the act, and that the necessary expenditure can be (not exceeding \$15,000), and that the sum of money provided by the act, £10,000, be paid to the Committee with the general proviso that the amount be divided half the money to be given to the British East African Officers' Colony and the other half to the British East African Disabled Officers' Colony which the Committee would not be able to do if the £10,000 were all the money to be provided.
