I have the honour to refer to Sir R. Gerynden's Confidential despatch No. 294 of 14th October last, transmitting copies of the Customs Tariff Ordinance, 1922, from which Your Grace will observe (vide page 7 of the despatch) that the luggage and equipment of the Inspector General, King's African Rifles and his Staff Officer were deleted from the list of articles to be imported free of customs duty.

It is noted that paragraphs 47 and 182 of Regulations for the King's African Rifles stipulate that the luggage equipment and stores of the Inspector General should be exempt from duty and in view of the fact that this exemption is no longer considered necessary, I have the honour to ask that steps may be taken to alter the King's African Rifles Regulations, withdrawing the exemption in so far as Tanganyika Territory, Uganda and Kenya are concerned.



I have at Dack the receipt
of Mr Northcote's Compt^d des^r No
No 363, of the 12th of June,
on the subject of the exemption
from Customs duty of luggage
and equipment belonging
to the Inspector General, King's
African Rifles, and his
Staff Officer.

2. Upon giving further
consideration to the withdrawal
of this exemption, which was
affected by the Customs tariff
Ordinance, 1922, I have
formed the opinion that
the special treatment

accorded to the Inspector General under previous arrangements was ~~unjustifiable~~, and that it is unreasonable to expect this Officer, who tours through all the E.S. Dependencies in the course of the year, to pay customs duty on the stores which he takes for his use; or entry into each dependency with him ~~wherever he may go~~ visited.

3. I have therefore decided that in respect of stores for the regulations of the R.A.R. should continue, and that his comfort should be in full measure and agreement of the Inspector General and his Staff Officer should be accorded to the list of articles to be imported free of customs
