My Lord Duke,

I have the honour to refer to my telegram No.168 of June 11th which dealt with a request by the East African Association for permission to send a delegation to England in connection with local Indian questions.

The history of the East African Association
 so far as can be ascertained, as follows:-

On July 10th, 1921, a communication was addressed to the Chief Native Commissioner by the Kikuyu Political Association notifying him that Harry Thuku, who had been designated as Secretary of that Association on June 25th. was no longer Secretary, because he was in Government employ. The reasons communicated verbally and confidentially were that he was too impatient of control by the Association and was apt to take independent action. Harry Thuku immediately formed another Association styled the East African Association, claiming that it represented all the natives in the Colony. Names of officials and members were never submitted to Government but the only members known are junior clerks and domestic servants in the employ of Europeans and Indians in Nairobi, and the Association, throughout its career, appears to have been nothing but a cloak for Harry Thuku and a few Indian and Nati ve

- The connection between this Association and the Indian Association is illustrated by the tenor of its telegram, which Your Grace communicated to this Government in Colonial Office telegram of June 2nd, the signatory is a Kikuyu native who is more commonly known by the name of Abdullah Tareira, under which name he was recently sentenced to 12 months imprisonment for his share in the Thurn riot. The sentence was reduced on appeal to a fine of Shillings 200/- or in default to 6 weeks Rigorous Imprisonment, which is alleged to have been paid for him by the Indian Association though it has not been possible to get confirmation of this. Since his release he has been under Police observation, and is known to have been holding meetings of an inflammatory tendency at the house of an Indian resident in Nairobi with the alleged object of raising funds to work for the return of Harry Thuku. It is therefore probable that he sees in the discussion of the Indian question an opportunity to get to England at the expense of his supporters to further his own aims. The telegram is alleged to have been inspired and drafted by one Mangal Das, a Sikh agitator and a leading member of the Indian Association.
 - 4. To account of revenue or expenditure is ever given by the collectors of the Thuku collections, but there can be no question that no inconsiderable portion goes to support his leading adherents, such as Abdullah Tareira, in idleness.
 - 5. I have no hesitation in assuring Your Grace that the telegram is in no way representative of any large

section of public opinion and is unworthy of serious attention.

6. The tenor of Your Grace's telegram of the 19th instant has been conveyed to the so-called Association, whose address is now c/o Messrs. Khambatta & Sons, an Indian firm in Nairobi.
