My Lord Duke .

With reference to Your Grace's despatch

Power under Section 6 (1) of the Crown Lands Ordinance
1915 to convert, without reference to the Secretary of
State, an agricultural into a township lease, I have the
honour to inform Your Grace that the Acting Governor laid
that despatch and Your Grace's telegram of Varch 12th
before his Executive Council.

- With regard to the 4th paragraph of Your Grace's despatch the advice of Executive Council in which Sir Charles Bowring concurred was that the charge by Government to the Company of an enhanced rental of Shs.72 per plot per annum in the proposed township ensured to Government all the increased revenue that might reasonably be expected out of the profits realised by private enterprise.
- The point to which in the 5th paragraph Your Grace drew attention had, as Your Grace surmised, been donsidered in January 1922 when the original application was approved by Sir Edward Northey in Council. Further consideration has been given to it and it appears to Government that no political issue will arise between Europeans and Indians in this case in view of the fact

Moreover the scheme was initiated before the present acute stage of the controversy had been reached: in this connection I would inform Your Grace that Executive Council recently declined to recommend a new scheme on the same lines elsewhere on the ground that the Indian Question did arise in regard to new proposals of the kind. It may also be remarked that the Company has already disposed of some plots in accordance with the original approval of its scheme of sub-division and that no protest by Indians has been recorded.

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4. The term "private township" in Sir R.Coryndon's despatch No.1686 of 12th December, 1922, was used to signify a distinction from a Government township due to the procedure whereby the holder of an agricultural lease, who wishes to sub-divide a portion of his holding into small plots, surrenders his title to that portion and is granted in its place t waship leases for each plot in the sub-divided portion at the specified rental.

These leases are issued under Sections 17 and 18 of Part 3 of the grown Lands Ordinance 1915 and contain the conditions required by the Sanitary Authorities as regards the construction and maintenance of roads and drains and other sanitary requisites. The disposal of these plots is at the discretion (Kave is to sub-division) of the lesses subject to the payment of the usual fees on transfer.
