in 5 of these electoral areas 1 candidate only was elected and these 5 were re-elected. The only election under Schedule III Rule 10, in particular, however, an objection was lodged on the ground of the improper rejection of a nomination paper. The objection was upheld with the result that the election was declared void and a date notified for a fresh election in the area concerned. In each of the remaining 6 electoral areas more candidates than one have been nominated and March 25th has been fixed as the date at which a poll will be taken in each of these areas.

The invalidation of the election in one of the areas referred to above necessitates considerable delay before the requisite preliminaries to a fresh election can be arranged, only 10 instead of 11 elected members will be in a position to take their seats when the new constitution of the Legislative Council comes into operation. I am advised that the case of one electoral area being for a short time unrepresented is covered by Article XXI of the Royal Instructions and as there are several important measures which require to be dealt with by the newly constituted Council, I have considered desirable further the issue of a new Order-in-Council which brings it into force.

5. Immediately the new Order-in-Council and Royal Instructions are applied the Governor and Ten Heads or Acting Heads of Departments become ex officio Members.

3. The Treasurer W. A. Morris.
4. The Chief Native Commissioner J. Ajaworth.
5. The Collector of Customs A. D. King.

Of these the first three are at present
of full strength; Mr Ajaworth is an additional
member and Dr King's wife is a new appointment.

As regards the other two official members,
it is proposed that Mr. V. J. Monson will cease
to be Secretary of State for India, and that the
intention of nominating and appointing a member
of the European race to take his place
among the native members of the Legislative Council.
I believe it would also be Sir Edward Northey's wish

to submit the proposed
list of names should be
submitted to the Legislative Council. Further both Mr. Mc-
Cormick and Wilson are candidates for election
to the Legislative Council and both are being
opposed in their electoral areas. I am therefore
of opinion that the best course would be to carry
on with only the ex officio members of Executive
Council until the full number of 11 European
unofficial members have been elected to the
Legislative Council. This will entail some delay
because of the necessity to which I have referred
above for arranging a fresh election in one of the
areas and I shall much regret the absence of
unofficial representation even for a limited period.
