1. Petition addressed to Your Grace by Mr. I. M. Ramos, 1930 IV Grade Clerk in the West African's Office at Mombasa, complaining of his deferred promotion to 3rd Grade.

2. Mr. Ramos asks for promotion to 3rd Grade in terms of Secretariat Confidential Circular No. 83 of the 27th August, 1920, but his claim could not be considered in view of the fact that he was not sufficiently senior for promotion. Mr. H. C. Castellino of the Treasury Department to whom Mr. Ramos refers, was the only clerk junior to himself, promoted to 3rd Grade and the promotion was made in view of the special qualifications for the particular work in which he is engaged.

3. On receipt of Mr. Castellino's description of the 10th of March, 1923, it was taken to remove the limitation on the promotion of 3rd Grade Officials by issuing Secretariat Circular No. 23 of the 15th of March, 1923. Clerks and other Clerks including those mentioned by Mr. Ramos junior to himself were promoted to this 3rd Grade in terms of this Circular; action thereon was, however, suspended.

I enclose herewith to you the following facts for your records in connection with the following:-

I served the service of the Kenya Government from 1st June 1915 until the 30th of June 1923, when I had no other course but to resign and register as a result of the great reduction made to be made by the Public Works Department.

During my nine years' service, I worked the whole term in the Government Coast Agent's Department in Mombasa, and was invariably recommended for a promotion to 1st Grade Clerkship by the various Heads of the Departments, under whom I served, as an exceptionally fit and competent employee. My claims for a well-deserving promotion were, therefore, based not only on the length of my service but also on the right of my personal merit and continuous efficient service.

In this connection I have the honour to attach copies of the correspondence exchanged between my Department and the Public Works Department under whose supervisory control the Coast Agent's Department has been brought at present, together with copies of my appeal to the local Government dated 17th April last and of a reply from the Secretariat thereon.

The work of the Department was recognized more than once during recent years and the reorganization of the Public Works Department did not involve any special action in the least in the Agent's Department, which, with the exception of the supervision of the Public Works Department, is almost three hundred miles off in the East, and carries out all its functions independently. The plan of the reorganization of the Public Works Department was spoiled, however, by sending that the services of few experienced clerks of the Agent's Department should be dispensed with to make room for the inexperienced clerks of the Public Works Department, who are now filling up the vacancies on transfer. It is the result of the supercilious design of Mr. Kewarth an irresponsible Official of the Public Works Department.

In this connection I regret that I cannot refrain myself from bringing to Your Grace's personal notice the fact that Mr. J. Kewarth has acted throughout his service in the above capacity in a most autocratic and biased manner in respect of the handling of the very responsible duties of the promotions of the staff; and the responsibility for this conduct rests more on him than on any other Official of the Public Works Department. The Local Government has also upheld the Officials of the Public Works Department and has overlooked altogether the merits of my contention.

As I am out of the service, and do not wish to reject same, I have no other desire but to bring to Your Grace's knowledge the wrongs which have been created in this distant corner of the Empire in matters connected with the claims of the non-European clerical staff, and to request that an enquiry may be held into the conduct of the Officials of the Public Works Department with special reference to Mr. Kewarth so that light may be thrown on the most irregular methods
