I desire leave to exhibit the following facts for your guidance, with a suggestion:-

I entered the service of the Kenya Government on the 1st June 1915 and remained there until the 4th of May 1923, when I was no longer called fit to be assigned to port as a result of the gross induction which was by me by the Public Works Department.

During my public works service, I worked the whole term in the Government Coast Agent's Department in Nairobi, and was lawfully recommended for a promotion to 1st Grade Clerkship by the various Heads of the Department, under whom I served, as an exceptionally fit and competent employee. My claims for a well deserving promotion were, therefore, based not only on the length of my service but also on the right of my personal merit and continuous efficient service.

In this connection I have the honour to attach copies of the correspondence exchanged between my Department and the Public Works Department under whose supervisory control the Coast Agent's Department has been brought at present. One copy of my appeal to the Local Government dated 17th April last and of a reply from the Secretary State.

that the position of Inspector General
of the Public Works Department is now vacant.
I have been requested to nominate a suitable
person to fill this position. I have therefore
arranged to interview the following types of officials
in the Public Works Department to ascertain their
views at the conclusion that the Public Works Department
is to remain for the time being in charge of the
Ministry, when recommendations were invited, for reorganization of the
Department as per Circular No. 23 of 1930 dated 19-2-1930. The
recommendations will further serve as your guide in this
matter. According to P. W. D. the following policy
should be adopted in view of the good & bad record of
the department. That is to say, that, those who
are fit & qualified for work, & are not liable to be turned
out in view of the reorganization, ought to be retained, and those who have
done their duty, & all other persons whom he deems fit
should be allowed to leave.

These words will also see the various statements
and remarks, however, they are left unaltered in my
hands. This document is a copy of which will be at
my disposal for your guidance.

With regard to the transfer of the
Inspector General of the Public Works Department
to the Head of that Department, endeavoured by
himself, and his responsible Officer, from the rank created
by his Department. I must emphasize that the reorganization
of the Public Works Department had no reference to the Head
Agent's Department and that therefore the plan intended to
nothing short of a subterfuge to evade the relative responsi-
bility in the question of my promotion. The Head Agent's
Department

The public works department was reorganized more than three hundred years ago and the reorganization of the Public Works Department which did not commence again in the year Mr. Agent's Department, whereupon the majority of the supervision of the Public Works Department, to include three hundred miles off the coast, and carries out all the - provisions independently. The plan of the reorganization of the Public Works Department was omitted of, however, to nothing but the services of few experienced clerks of the Agent's Department should be dispensed with to make room for the inexperienced clerks of the Public Works Department, who are now filling up the vacancies on transfer. It is the result of the unscrupulous design of Mr. Newarth an irresponsible official of the Public Works Department.

In this connection I regret that I cannot refrain myself from bringing to Your Grace's perusal notice the fact that Mr. J. Newarth has acted throughout his service in the above capacity in a most autocratic and biased manner in respect of the handling of the very responsible duties of the promotions of the staff; and the responsibility for this conduct rests more on him than on any other official of the Public Works Department. The Local Government has also upheld the officials of the Public Works Department and has overlooked altogether the merits of my contention.

As I am out of the service, and do not wish to rejoin same, I have no other remedy but to bring to Your Grace's knowledge the prevailing abuse created in this distant corner of the Empire in matters connected with the claims of the non-European Clerical staff, and to request that an enquiry may be held into the conduct of the Officials of the Public Works Department with special reference to Mr. Newarth so that light may be thrown on the most irregular methods -

direct with the request that you will kindly enquire into the
case as to the reasons why my promotion, though invariably
promised, has not been given effect to.

With reference to registration of proposed changes in the 1920 Surveyors Act, I have the honor to enclose herewith my present conclusions as to the best method of the recommendations for practical work which you have submitted.

I have enclosed a draft of very short staff copy of the proposed changes and hope that it will be circular under your consideration. As regards the Secretary, Mr. J. H. and Mr. G. will be kept longer or shorter than 1 to 2 years, I am sure, than required by the Assistant Secretary.

In the view of my colleagues he deserves to remain at his present post until his present term of office has ended and a replacement is found. However, any arrangement to the contrary to the present regulations, and provided that the new grade will not interfere with his pension, he is willing to allow his name to be put forward, if necessary in consequence of failing next year provided his health does not deteriorate and if this can be arranged.

The appointments of Mr. C. M. R. and Mr. G. to the new posts referred to in the new article of the Statute will come into operation on 1st August 1920 and while I do not consider that the first and fourth grades of the Civil Service to which grade, I would specially refer to, as affecting the Coast Guard Service, H. 

I beg leave to state that I am very much obliged to you for your Circular No. 1348 dated 6/2/23 in which you have directed the heads of departments to furnish to the Government of India by 1st May 1923 their views as to the desirability of the law for the protection of the public evidence. Your opinion that the law is not at all satisfactory has been fully borne out by the fact that the law has been much irritated and passed off as a bad law by the public and his own Minister of State. The members of the Legislative Assembly have arrived at the same conclusion after a long session of Public opinion, which I have on the whole observed and which I am now aware of, is resulted in the following resolution to expect redress to my just grievances. 



MY LORD DUKE,

With reference to the late Viscount Hardcourt's confidential despatch of July 26th, 1913, regarding his offer to Mr. E. Cowley-Cobb of land on the Mau Escarpment, I have the honour to report to Your Grace that this offer was now withdrawn. It is determined that as the time limit accorded to my first acceptance of this land has expired the offer is rejected as not accepted and is withdrawn. I have the honour to Your Grace to approve the reasons for this action.

3. In the third enclosure to the letter of reference to Mr. Cobb it is stated that "the holder may remain for 10 years."

- (a) the actual area of 10,000 acres in the Mau Forest.

With reference to the late Viscount Harcourt's confidential despatch of July 26th, 1914, regarding my lease to Mr. E. 2. The whole question was reviewed by Executive Council on the 13th ultime, and Sir Charles B. Hall concurred in the unanimous advice that the offer of 35,000 acres of land and a free timber licence over 5,000 acres for 15 years should be regarded as not accepted, the time limit having expired, and should be withdrawn.

It may be within Your Grace's knowledge that the posture of Mr. Piyno-Gobb's affairs for some time past has been far from satisfactory, and it has recently been brought to the notice of Government that the Bank of South Africa is of the view that in that his area of 1,700 acres is in fact an asset for recovery and has appeared as such in the NOVEMBER issue of "The Times". That notwithstanding an effort has been made to induce the Bank to accept a direct payment with a view to the early settlement of the late Mr. Gobb's debts, the Bank has so far refused to do so, and has insisted on the recovery of the amount due to it by the late Mr. Gobb.

It is the opinion of the Bank that the best way to effect this would be to sue for the recovery of the amount due to it, and that the Bank will be willing to act in this connection.

We trust that Your Grace will appreciate that the Bank has been asked to do this, and that this action of Col. Collyer's in this connection of circumstances of this case will satisfy Your Grace that Government's action in withdrawing its offer is reasonable and proper.




