I return herewith the report, estimates and appendices on the Thike-Hyeri extension, together with the plane and specifications.

- 2. If a spare copy of the report is available I shall be glad to have it, but I understand that only one copy of the plans and specifications have been sent to the Government. Presumably Colonel Robertson has more copies; if so, it would certainly be advisable for the Government to obtain another complete set.
- plans, and specifications will how be sent to the Colonial Office for transmission to the Consulting Engineers. It would be wise to expedite this transmission in order that Major Rhodes may be able to discuss matters with the Consulting Engineers before he leaves England.
 - 4. In the meantime I have asked the Acting Chief Engineer (Mr. C.M. Bunbury) to recalculate the estimates submitted, and I attach copy of his report.
- 5. The recalculation is based partly on what I have agreed to in regard to the issue price of secondhand material released from the main line, railway rates, supervision charges, etc., and partless a general investigation of Colonel Robertson's figures by Mr. Bunbury.
- 6. It will be observed that in the matter of supervision Cole

Robertson, in his analysis, took the total cost of 83 miles and on that calculated a percentage proportion for 58 miles. It will be obvious that this method results in a large reduction in expenditure which might not materialize, under Colonel Robertson's basis of calculation, in the actual cost of the first section. This is responsible for the comparatively small reduction in general charges estimated by Mr. Sumbury in his calculations on the first section taken by itself.

- 7. Mr. Bunbury's figures reduce the probable cost of the line to the Tana River from £9,376 per mile to £6,757 per mile, a difference of £2,619 per mile. The major pertion of this difference, i.e. £1,645 per mile, ries in the cost of permanent may, as it is proposed to charge out the secondhand material at the rate of £750 per mile. - investigations, if arrangements could be made for us to adopt whatever better alignment we are able to locate without first having to report the matter to the Consulting Engineers, because if such further reports should be necessary there would be considerable delay.
- I understand that there is such propagands work being undertaken by private contractors in England, with the object of continuing to build lines in this Colony by private enterprise, but if it is at all possible I should very much like to see the construction of the line from Thika to the Tana Elver left entirely to the Uganda Rathway to be carried through as a test of what the Railway can do, partly departmentally and partly by sub-contract. If this could be done I feel sure the results would challenge comparison with any results obtained by private anterprise.
- 13. If the construction is left to us Mr. Sumoury will probably be asked to take charge of the work under the control of the Chief Engineer.
