been one misunderstanding

despatch.

3. In general practice
governing the matter in
England and Northern
Ireland pensions are granted

on a scale on the average
value of an officer's emoluments
during the two years preceding
his retirement from the service.

It was felt that there are certain
certain considerations
which it stated as follows:

(i) In the case of European
officers serving in East Africa
the average is taken over a
period of two years only, since
the climate is regarded as
