


My Lord Duke,

With reference to Your Grace's telegram
of the last 22nd, relating to the grant of a
Drying and Cleaning Plant at Nairobi for the
processing of maize which is to be made the basis
prescribed in the said Drying Plant; I have the
honour to inform Your Grace that no more than
100 bags come into operation per month will be
left in the hands of Shippers to dispose of as
best they can subject to Part III of the Public
Health Ordinance, 1921. In order that the
quantity of rejected maize may be kept as low as
possible the most strict control of all was fixed and
the arrangements made for preliminary voluntary
Inspection at Kisumu as reported in paragraph 6 of
my despatch No. 1403 of the 19th ultime. The aim
of the Director of Agriculture is however to
raise the permissible maize content to the
South African Standard of 1906 when the Drying and
Cleaning Plant has been set up. Already there
is evidence that some Kenya maize - particularly
native-grown - has obtained a bad reputation in
certain markets and it would have been unwise to
postpone grading until the Drying and Cleaning
Plant had been established and in the meantime to
continue to permit the export of ungraded maize.

The activities of the Plant will not of course remove from suppliers their responsibility for the disposal of their rejected maize but it is reasonable to assume that the Plant will be very freely used not only to bring maize up to standard but also, to improve the quality of shipments which would pass the ultimate test. The knowledge that the quality of maize can be improved by the processes of the Drying and Cleaning Plant will be of very great importance to purchasers of maize from native growers.

4. I regret that I am not yet in a position to submit final recommendations as to the control and administration of the Plant. These points are still under consideration between the Railway Council and Government and I will address Your Grace further at a later date.

5. On the basis of an export of 300,000 bags each of "European" and "Native" green maize and an estimate that 85% of the former and 20% of the latter will require to be treated before export it is considered that 75,000 bags will pass through the Plant. At present the cleaning charge is 4d. per bag but this figure does not include any charge on capital expenditure. It is the intention of this Government to pay off the capital cost of the Plant plus interest in 10 years and consequently an annual charge of £1,200 - i.e. 3d. cents per bag on 75,000 bags must be reckoned in addition to the revenue necessary to cover recurrent working expenses. It is therefore probable that a charge of

.../70 cents a bag (including re-bagging) would be sufficient. I am advised that, if later experience showed that a charge of 1/- a bag were necessary, the main industry could support it. Your Grace will, I trust, agree that it is hardly possible at this stage to fix a definite charge - the principle of fixation will however be that the charge will re-inburse Government fully without exceeding the capacity of the trade.
