I should be glad to have your
comments on, or your concurrence in the

The formal Agreement signed by Mr.
Mapp is similar to that in the file of Miss
Weld, File 21500. In that case the agreement
was signed a year ^{later} after the engagement,
when she protested that she had reason to
leave privileges which were taken away
by the agreement, the Governor had to climb
down and grant leave. You will notice that
Mapp's Agreement is not dated.

In asking for the War Office
opinion in Governor's view that leave should
be granted to ^{such cases} Clearance Section staff,
we should point out the possibility of
cases arising in which, before the Agreement
was signed, there had been an anticipation
of leave being granted, in order that our
staff be free to deal with such cases on

The Honourable The Colonial Secretary,
NAIROBI.

I have the honour to submit the case of the Staff, - European and Asiatic - employed in this Department, who are unprovided for in the way of leave or any of the privileges that are usually attached to Government Service, and I would request that their case be represented to the Secretary of State for the Colonies for the favourable consideration of the Army Council.

The following Members of my Staff were employed on the Staff of the Chief Paymaster, E.A.P.C. as Non-Commissioned Officers and took their discharge and continued to serve as Civilian Accountants and Clerks:

- Mr. SAUVAGE

and they are by virtue of their Military Service entitled on release to a return passage to England or South Africa. The remaining Members of my Staff, who were locally engaged by me on taking up my appointment as Officer in Charge, King's African Rifles Clearance Section, in April, 1921, are,

and the Asiatic

do not share in that concession.

All the Members of my Staff are on a temporary basis, subject to termination at any time. All of them have had leave. About 1000 were included in the list of those temporarily appointed. It is difficult to estimate the amount of work which is being done at the present time. It is especially during the War accounts in the area.

It was by right of the fact that the rates of pay are sanctioned owing to the very temporary nature of the work which they are doing. The rates are slightly higher than those at present prevailing locally, but as these appointments were specially selected to meet the needs of individuals who possessed experience of the kind of work to be undertaken, I do not consider that the rates themselves are excessive. It is a sufficient reason to deny them leave privileges.

I estimate the services of these individuals to be required for a considerable period. It therefore seems desirable to recommend that the services of these individuals should be favourably considered for continuation of their leave conditions, so far as possible, in the event of their return to Government service.
