My dear Bennett,

I have your letter of the 24th March on the subject of the restriction of land purchase in East Africa. The Secretary of State has telegraphed to the acting Governor of East Africa Protectorate informing him that while he does not propose to interfere with the sale advertised for April 7th, a question of general policy is involved which he will discuss personally with Sir Edward Hartney, the Governor of the Protectorate. The acting Governor has been instructed that, in the meantime, no further notifications of the same kind should be issued pending Lord Milner's decision.
