I have had under consideration the practice existing arrangements under which, in the case of officers whose retirement from service is approved whilst they are in this country, the form of particulars of pension is sent to them officers for completion as far as possible before transmission to the Governor. Experience has shown that little advantage, if any, has been gained by this practice as statements furnished by officers on the forms are usually inadequate and invariably seldom if ever add to the information already on record.

I propose therefore to discontinue the practice and to await in all cases the receipt of pension papers from the Government concerned.

With reference to my letter dated 20th of the 18th of April, I have the honor to transmit to you, for your information, a copy of the application made by Reynolds, late Executive Assistant, to the Government, regarding the compensation allowances for which he is eligible.

2. I feel compelled to observe that it is a matter for regret that the Government of India should delay, as in this case, the formulation of rules or particulars for the calculation of compensation allowances or pension, as such delay necessarily gives rise to inconvenience both to the citizen concerned and to this Department.
