As soon as the question of qualifications has been settled, a Bill can be drafted, and if time permits, I should wish to have an opportunity of studying its provisions in detail before it is

(b) Meanwhile, I will submit for His Majesty's approval the detailed amendments to the Royal Instructions necessitated by the change which is to be made in the composition of the Council.
