MINUTE OF CHURCH AND NATION COMBITTEE
OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

KENYA COLONY I BIIGRATION .-

The Committee had under consideration a cablegram recently received from leading Missionaries of the Church of Scattand and Church of England in Kenya Colony, and also correspondence dealing with developments that had led to the dispatch of the cablegram. In both cablegram and correspondence, it was urged that a representation should be forthwith adde to the Colonial Office, reporting that there is a unanimous feeling in Missionary circles in Kenya as to the grave must to the development of the Natives of the Colony, which is already being caused, and will be intensified by a continuance of the unrestricted immigration of other races.

The missionaries feel that as the result of the training in industrial and general education which has now been carried on for a number of years, the African is showing a capacity that proves his fitness for increasingly - and in a short time completely - filling all the subordinate services in the Colony, from skilled indour up to posts in Government and mercantile offices. At present these are largely filled by immigrants from races that have enjoyed educational and civilising advantages for longer periods. In fairness to the African it is strongly urged that in his own country he is that first claim to consideration at the hands of the British Government; and that in view of his proved capacity and his increasing development, the immigration of other races should.

should be restricted to the point at which the services of such immigrants are necessary for the Colony's welfare. An unrestricted flood of alien peoples filling the places in the Colony's life naturally belonging to the African, would deprive the many Africans who are responding to the uplifting endeavour of the dissions and the Government, or all incentive to progress. In the words of the cablegram, "We strongly urge active support to proposed restriction of immigration, for the sake of native races; we are convinced that the development, industrial and otherwise, of the African is seriously jeopardised unless this safeguard is provided; immediate action is essential."

The Committee agreed to record that they cordially share the convictions of their correspondents, and resolved in the interests of the African of Kenya Colony, to forward a copy of this Minute to His Grace, H.M. Secretary of State for the Colonies, and to request His Grace's sympathetic consideration of these views that are urged so strongly by men who are giving their lives to the elevation of the people of Africa.
