Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th inst., bearing No. 32306/1923.

At the meeting at the Colonial Office on 4th May last the full Indian Delegation was not present. Mr Desai in the concluding part of his statement made at the said meeting specifically mentioned the names of Messrs. Y.A.Karemjeh and Tayab Ali as the remaining two members of the Kenya Indian Delegation, and said they were en route to London.

The East African Indian National Congress at Nairobi selected 6 persons whose names I have already given in my last letter, to proceed to London to represent the Indian case, and gave them authority to co-opt any other person or persons. It also undertook to pay the expenses of these delegates.

When Messrs. Desai, A.M.Jeevanjee and Virjee reached London via. Bombay, Mr. Abdul Wahib happened to be in London and offered to serve on the deputation, agreeing to pay his own expenses. His services were accepted and he was therefore present at the interview at the Colonial Office. Some domestic reasons necessitated his going away earlier than he had expected and he left here on 24th June last.

Long before the Kenya Government decided to pay the expenses of the Europeans and Indian Delegations, and some time before the Tanganyika ordinances were put into force Mr. Jeevanjee and Mr. Tayab Ali were approached on behalf of the Congress to join the proposed Indian deputation to London and they agreed.

They were to have left Zanzibar by s.s."Chile" the boat which brought H.E.The Governor and the European deputation here, but as they could not get berths on her they had to book their passages by s.s."Marichal Gallieri"

which was advertised to leave Zanzibar about 12th April last but which did not sail until 21st April.

During this interval the Tanganyika situation, having become very serious, these two delegates were requested to study the whole question personally so as to be able to make special representations to the Colonial Secretary.

It will thus be seen that Messrs. Jeevanjie and Syah Ali are here primarily as Members of the Kenya Indian Delegation, and as such justly entitled to have their expenses met out of the Kenya funds.

I may be allowed to point out here that both these gentlemen own valuable properties at Nairobi and Mombasa and pay taxes to the Kenya Government. Mr. Y.A.K. Jeevanjie has very large business interests at Mombasa, and there also owns a residential house where he spends at least a part of his time every year.

Under the circumstances I have the honour to submit that His Grace will be pleased to reconsider his decision to allow the expenses of both these delegates to be met from Kenya funds.
