I have the honour to refer to paragraph 3 of Your Lordship's despatch Confidential of December 11th and to paragraph 3 of Sir H. J. Read's private letter of the 2nd March to Mr. Robert Hamilton, respecting the payment of leave salaries to officers in East Africa and to enquire what the position is in regard to pensions.

2. It has been customary to make payment at the rate of Raills/- to the £ where the pensioned officer is resident in East Africa and this method seems to be equitable. It appears, however, that Mr. Barton Wright was informed that he would be paid at the current rate of exchange and I attach a minute by the Treasury on the subject.

3. I assume that this exchange problem will disappear when the rupee is stabilized at 2/- and salaries and pensions generally adjusted to meet the situation thus created. In the meanwhile I should be glad to receive Your Lordship's authority to continue the existing practice.

In connection with para 3, 3, 4, and 5 of
My memo No. 579/525/52 of the 12th ultimo.

3. I understand that Mr. Barton-Wright who has
recently returned to the Protectorate was informed
before he left England that his pension would be paid
at the current rate of exchange.

4. Apart from Mr. Barton-Wright there are five
retired civil servants drawing pension in this country
and up to the present they have been paid at £s.15/- to
the £ for up to the date of receipt of the Secretary of
State's despatch confidential of December 11th 1950 no
question of exchange had arisen either as regards leave
allowances or pensions of officers remaining in the
Protectorate.

5. Even upon receipt of the despatch above
referred to I did not take the ruling contained in
para (5) of Sir H. J. Head's letter of December 8th
to the Select Committee as applying to pensions for
those who, what appear to me, sound reasons why it
should not so apply.

6. The Government has always been opposed on
principle to officers taking leave in the
civil or military service owing to injured health and
a prospective liability to payment of pension at an
earlier age than eight otherwise necessary. These
considerations provide strong arguments in favour
of those to be taken in the country for the war
is over.

6. The position is quite different in regard to
pensions. If an officer stay in the Protectorate
after he retires he does so at his own risk and the
liability of the Government is reduced by the shorter
time such an officer may be absent from his post to
allow him to receive reasonable total pensions of
less than £15/- per month which should be paid on the same
basis as salaries of officers on duty for their services.

7. In view however of the unofficial information
I have received in regard to Mr. Barton-Wright I should
be glad if the question could be referred to the
Secretary of State for a definite ruling. In the mean-
time I propose, subject to your approval, to nominate
pensions at £s.15/- to the £.
