Your Grace,

It has not been possible for me to obtain till to-day a copy of the White Paper entitled "Indians in Kenya", and hence the delay in writing to you this letter.

I consider it would be ungracious of me if I refrained at this time from expressing to the Imperial Government, on behalf of the Missionaries and of the African Natives of Kenya, my very great appreciation of the terms of the general policy which has been laid down by His Majesty's Government for dealing with the points at issue in the Kenya controversy.

The opinion recorded that "the interests of the African Natives must be paramount, and that if, and when, those interests and the interests of the immigrant races should conflict, the former should prevail must be looked upon by those with the welfare of the Africans at heart, as a pronouncement worthy of the best British Colonial traditions, and one that will go down to history in Kenya as a Charter of African Native rights.

The Alliance of Protestant Missionary Societies in 1918 definitely asked the Government that a Missionary be appointed to represent unofficially native interests on the Legislative Council. They did so, believing that it would strengthen rather than otherwise the hands of the Government officials who particularly represented those interests. Last year the question of a Missionary being on the Executive Council was also mooted. That His Majesty's Government has now agreed to the suggestion that a Missionary be nominated on both Councils, and that the European Settlers have expressed themselves as in agreement with the idea, must be a matter of gratification to the Missionary bodies. I can assure Your Grace, that the Protestant, and I believe, also the Roman Catholic Missionaries will welcome this opportunity of assisting the Government in their great task of trusteeship for the African natives, and that they will help by every means in their power to make the present settlement one that will allay racial feeling and that will encourage racial co-operation.

Before I left Africa, there was grave anxiety felt amongst the tribes of Kenya as to the insecurity of their lands; this had resulted from the alienation of territories occupied by them for the purposes of European Settlement.

The Alliance of Protestant Missionary Societies in 1918 definitely asked the Government that a Missionary be appointed to represent unofficially native interests on the Legislative Council. They did so, believing that it would strengthen rather than otherwise the hands of the Government officials who particularly represented those interests. Last year the question of a Missionary being on the Executive Council was also mooted. That His Majesty's Government has now agreed to the suggestion that a Wissionary be nominated on both Councils, and that the European Settlers have expressed themselves as in agreement with the idea, must be a matter of gratification to the Missionary bodies. I can assure Your Grace, that the Protestant, and I believe, also the Roman Catholic Missionaries will welcome this opportunity of assisting the Government in their great task of trusteeship for the African natives, and that they will help by every means in their power to make the present settlement one that will allay racial feeling and that will encourage racial co-operation.

Before I left Africa, there was grave anxiety felt amongst the tribes of Kenya as to the insecurity of their lands; this had resulted from the alienation of territories occupied by them for the purposes of European Settlement. This feeling of insecurity was not altogether allayed by the assurance of your predecessor in Office, the Rt. Hon. Mr. Winston Churchill, to the effect that their interests in the matter of land were being safeguarded by him. I believe that they have no desire to go back on what has been done in the past, but they would like some form of legal tenure to be given to their tribal representatives, to be held in trust for them. I am sure the pronouncement of His Majesty's Government as to a general policy, will do much to allay the feeling of insecurity that they have had, but if Your Grace would enable them to obtain some form of legal tenure to secure to them their lands in perpetuity, I am sure the native tribes would welcome it as a first real expression of the trusteeship of the Imperial Government.

Although, naturally, this matter is not dealt with in the Memorandum, it does arise incidentally in reference to the proposed grant of land to Indians in the Lowlands. I should be wrong did I not put forward the view on behalf of the natives, that the sufficiency of land for the African natives, both as to present and future needs, should be gone into before any further alienation of land takes place. I believe from what the Indians have said

that they themselves would be prepared to acknowledge the first claims of the Africans in this matter.

Finally, may I thank Your Grace and those connected with you for your courtesy to me personally, in the position I was invited by His Excellency the Governor to fill, and for the opportunities afforded to me of expressing my views on matters which I considered affected native interests.
