My dear Bridges,

I am not sure whether you dealt with certain correspondence between the Colonial Office and the Treasury ending with your letter 83784 of the 3rd of February, 1921 about an allowance for the Officers who deputise for Governors in the Mast African Dependencies. If you are not concerned, you will no doubt pass this letter on to the right quarter.

We'had at that time a prolonged official correspondence with the Treasury on the subject, and in the end accepted - faute de mieux - the Treasur decision in the letter quoted, and informed all the Governors that a Governor's Deputy might be refunded necessary expenditure on entertainment actually incurred by him up to a maximum not exceeding £1 a day for the period during which he acts as Deputy.

This, of course, was not what we

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originally wanted, but we thought that we might communicate your decision and then see whether any complaints came in. From time to time representations have been made to us makes, but with one exception these were made semi-officially, because the point at issue was not one that the officers concerned liked to raise formally.

As the ruling now stands, a Deputy can only claim a reimbursement of the actual expenditure incurred. It is obviously unpleasant for any Colonial Secretary or other highly-placed officer who is deputising to have to send to the local Treasury and Audit a statement that he has spent such and such a sum on entertainment in the Governor's absence.

It is no use our writing to you officially if you are going to turn down any fresh suggestion at once, but, do you see any objection to an arrangement by which an

unconditional

unconditional allowance of £1 a day is paid to a Governor's Deputy to meet incidental expenses while so acting? We should be quite prepared, if you wish it, to fix a minimum number of days at a stretch for which a Deputy must act before he can draw the allowance - say, seven days, Thus, a Deputy, if he acts for seven days or more, would receive £1 a day without any question as to the actual expenditure incurred, which might certainly be more than the allowance in some cases. If he deputises for less than seven days, then he would get nothing at all. Of course, the limitation of seven days is arbitrary, and if you could see your way to agree to the unconditional allowance without any such restriction, so much the better.

The present position is clearly unsatisfactory, and I believe it is the fact that the Deputies refrain from making claims in respect of this allowance, as things now are, owing to their dislike of the condition which compels them to say exactly what they have spent on entertainment. I am bound to say that I sympathise with them in this view, I believe you will too

act.
