Dear Parkinson.

Thanks for your letter of the 25th and the Official Correspondence with Carpenter about Sleeping Sickness Control in East Africa. I received a copy of his official letter on January 9th. from Uganda and expected the matter would have come up before this.

The general idea seems to me sound-

- (1) Sleeping Sickness is present in all three Gritish territories, between which communication is easy over the Victoria Lake and less so by land, and is no respecter of "boundaries".
- (2) Different policies of Sleeping Scances have been pursued in the past in these three countries. At must conduce to efficiency, save expense, and stop leaks to have a common advisor for the three.
- (V) The control of Sleeping Sickness has long been studied in Uganda and in two instances lately, as Carpenter says, advice has been sought from Uganda tom Kenya and Tanganyika.

I have the honour to ask you seriously to consider the following points and to bring the matter before the proper authorities. I request that a copy of this letter may be forwarded to the Secretary of State.

- I. For a long time it has been felt in Uganda that the control of Sleeping Sickness on Lake Victoria should be in the hands of one authority, or that at least there should be one central authority in the position of consultant or referee who should be able to advise the analogy of the situation as regards the Veterinary Department is obvious.
- II. The necessity of a single control for Lake Victoria has been urged both by Dr Marshall in 1920 when acting as Senior Medical Officer in charge Sleeping Sickness and by Mr Fiske in his administrative capacity as Reclamation Officer for Lake Victoria during the past two years.

Kenya and Tanganyika territory in the past have not dealt with Sleeping Sickness in the manner adopted by Uganda, and the radical differences have made many difficulties on the borders of Uganda and Kenya.

III. The need of expert advice on Sleeping Sickness appears to have been felt by the authorities of Kenya Colony who wrote in September 1922 asking if the services of Mr Fiske or Dr Carpenter could be spared to map out areas for clearing in Kavirondo, Kenya to defray expenses and salary locally.

(Despatch from His Excellency, Kenya).

IV. The question of Sleeping Sickness as carried by Gossina palealis is a much bigger one for Uganda than for either Kenya or Tanganyika territory. Sleeping Sickness is a danger to Uganda not only on Lake Victoria but in the Eastern, Western and most particularly in the Northern Province.

As regards palealis Kenya is concerned only with Lake Victoria but there is Sleeping Sickness carried by this fly on the shores of Lake Tanganyika.

V. But even with 0. mergitang Uganda isconcerned as much as the other two territories.

An outbreak of acute human Trypanesomiasis has recently occurred near Mwanza for which aid was sought from Uganda.

(Letter 160/43 of April 18th 1922 from the Acting Chief becretary Dar-es-Salaam) Such an outbreak produced by conditions describe by Dr Duke in his report, might occur in any locality where moraitang exists, and the danger of its spread from one perritory into another through the agency of moraitans is obvious.

VI. For these reasons therefore I have the honour to ask that on the analogy of the Veterinary Adviser an appointment be created of Sleeping Sickness Adviser for Uganda and the neighbour ing territories of Kenya and Tanganyika. The Officer helding such appointment should also be in intimate relation with the Medical authorities of the Sudan, to whom the question of Sleeping Sickness on the Uganda-Sudanese border is of much importance, and also with the Congo authorities. This would mean enlargement of the acopeof the duties of the present Senior Medical Officer in charge Sleeping Sickness, Uganda.

VII. The Officer selected for the appointment would naturally be based in Uganda, in view of the facts stated in pars IV and of para VI.

VIII. Further, I have the henour to ask that in the even of such an Office being created the appointment may be offered to me. My qualifications for the Office are:

 - Medical Officer in charge Sleeping Sickness, Ugan I have obtained considerable experience of Sleeping Sickness and Glessina palpalis under condition differing widely as possible and embracing ever of race and country in the four Provinces of Ugan During my extensive journeys I have also come in contact with the other three species of Glessing infecting Uganda; viz morsitans, fusca, and palligates.
