desire to express our gratitude to H.M's Government for the full and careful consideration given to the constitutional and administrative issues which have been raised in our Colony by pressure from India.

We wish to record our view that the numerical representation accorded by the decision of H.M's Government to the Indian Community is excessive and not warranted by the importance of the Indian Community relatively to the other Communities of the Colony.

We believe that the principle of Residential Segregation is conducive to the happiness and well being of communities differing so widely in social habits as the communities of Kenya, and regret that the principle is not 'effinitely established in the decision.

We recognise, however, that the fundamental constitutional principles, for which we have stood in the earnest belief that they are essential to the stability of the British Empire, are confirmed by the decision.

On the understanding that this decision as to principles is final on the part of H.M. Government, and that controversy as to the detailed legislative and administrative applications of these principles will hereafter be confined to the local channels, provided by the Constitution of the Colony, we hereby accept the decision in the hope and belief that the European Community in Kenya will realise the special difficulties confronting H.M's Government in these complicated issues, and will also accord its general acceptance.

We recognise that the Charter provided by these principal assistates a special obligation on the part of Hill Surapean subjects in Kenya to strive for the general well-being of the Colony.
