## MINUTES

These reports as a whole suffer from the fact that they were either written either last December, when Sir R. Coryndon had not been long in Kenya, or during Sir R. Coryndon's recent leave. They are therefore in some instances out of date, and in many not based on personal knowledge. However, in nearly every case something is said, which is more satisfactory than the "nothing to add" which has been rather a feature of Kenya reports in the past.
