

My Lord,

I have the honour to refer to my telegram No. 141 of 17th March regarding the increase of traffic to be expected from the Magadi Soda Company, and, in this connection, to transmit copies of letters from the General Manager and Mr. Lawley, together with the opinion of the Acting Solicitor General as to the liability of the Railway Administration to fulfil their contract unless fresh notice is given by the Company.

2. I should be grateful if Your Lordship would inform the Magadi Company that no responsibility can be attached to the Uganda Railway if, in the event of the Uganda Railway Administration being asked to handle extra tonnage prior to 1st July 1921, delay occurs in the transportation thereof. I would respectfully point out that Your Lordship's telegram of 20th February 1920 cannot be accepted by the Railway Administration as being a notice to deal with 160,000 tons per annum within the terms of the Contract with the Magadi Soda Company prior to that date and request Your Lordship's instructions as to whether I have interpreted it correctly.

MAGADI SODA TRAFFIC.

I have the honour to inform you that on the 8th October 1919, the "acting" Company gave twelve months' notice in accordance with paragraph 43 (a) of the Agreement dated 12th April 1911 requiring the Railway to carry 160,000 tons per annum.

2. On 20th June 1919 the Secretary of State cabled that the carriage of this quantity would not be required until about July next, vide your No. 15227/75 of 27th June.

3. It should be noted that this cable used the word "about".

4. On account of this indefiniteness I wrote the Local Manager on the 2nd December last asking if he would give me some idea of the tonnage of Soda that will be offered the Railway during the coming year, and he replied on the 6th idea:

"I regret that I am unable to give you the information you require until I receive advice from London of the shipment dates of the new plant from England."

As soon as this comes to hand your enquiry will have attention.

5. The reason why I am so anxious to know when a large quantity will have to be handled is, that I must engage extra train crews, and this as a rule takes several months to do, and naturally do not want to engage them before they are really required; otherwise I may have them on my hands without being able to give them work. Nor do I want to be placed in a position whereby I cannot carry all the Soda that is offered and then have to meet claims for not fulfilling our part of the Contract.

6. As some definite arrangement should be come to, I shall be glad if you will cable the Colonial Office requesting them to find out the exact date when the Company will start giving the Railway the 160,000 tons per annum - or, if this information cannot be given that we consider the previous notice of October 1919 as cancelled and that a fresh twelve months' notice must be given; otherwise we cannot hold ourselves responsible for the transportation of the Soda.

7. As you are aware 21 locomotives and various rolling stock are on order to handle this traffic, and Clause 10 of the Lease will doubtless have to be enforced, but unfortunately this Clause does not refer to the payment of any extra staff engaged and lying idle, and it would I think be extremely difficult to bring men out here on a temporary agreement. I should add that the date when operations commenced was not yet been fixed although the matter has been referred to the Colonial Office by the Company.

8. Might I suggest that the Attorney General be consulted as to our legal position with regard to para. 6 and 7.

If, as I gather from the Hon'ble General Manager's Uganda Railway letter, no notice to carry large quantities of soda has been given by the Magadi Soda Company since that referred to of October 1918, I think that the position is made clear and that the Magadi Soda Company have themselves cancelled the notice of October 1918 by their letter of 14th July, 1919, (I attach a copy for reference since it may be that this letter is not included in our file).

However I agree with the Hon'ble the General Manager, Uganda Railway, in his proposal to cable the Company who it is possible may not be in full possession of the facts and in ignorance of their Manager's action.

Legally the Railway Administration are undoubtedly entitled to a fresh notice without further action on their part.

Dear Sir,

I have received a cable from the "agadi Soda Company Limited" saying that they have decided to shut down forthwith their production until such time as they can erect some mechanical means of dealing with the excavation and general treatment of the soda, the present system by hand labour being found too expensive. It will therefore, not be necessary for you in the meantime to go to the expense of providing additional rolling stock to work a large tonnage as it was anticipated would be required in October next. I will arrange with the Company to give you at least a year's notice when they will require a large tonnage to be carried.

I shall take the opportunity of calling upon you during the present week, and explain the whole position to you.

Traffic of Magadi Soda Company - Your Note 18228  
18th of 2nd February and 10th March.

I regret the delay in replying but it took some time to go into the fuel figures - the coal on order will I consider be sufficient to deal with this traffic.

Please refer to my letter No.M.6531/104 of 18th February - I should like to know what action has been taken.

I note the Secretary of State in his cable of 20th February states "Magadi Company gives notice ~~annual~~ rate of 160,000 tons per annum ~~as~~ from 1st July next".

The rolling stock is no doubt being delivered satisfactorily but new Station's and quarters have to be erected and the matter of who will pay the full cost of equipping the Magadi Railway is yet yet settled via your cable to the Colonial Office No.93 of 21st February.

Under these circumstances I cannot be responsible if there be a delay in the carrying of this 160,000 tons - the Company should be made to give us the twelve months notice stipulated in the Contract.
