But I would urge that it is equally well established that French Subjects are not exempt from ordinary taxation and I am advised that the payment of death duties falls within the scope of the latter obligation.

4. In this connection Your Lordship will recollect that in the enclosure to Your Lordship's despatch No. 1451 of 31st December Lord Curzon saw no objection to the principle of the Traders Licensing Ordinance, 1919, which imposed taxation on French traders, although the French Consul protested that such payment was contrary to the provisions of Treaty of 1844 which provided that trade would be perfectly free.

5. As the matter is one of great importance from the point of view of revenue I would ask Your Lordship if, upon further consideration of the points which I have mentioned, Your Lordship would be disposed to agree to the payment of such duties being claimed.
