My Lord,

I have the honour, at the request of the Principal Medical Officer, to submit for Your Lordship's consideration certain points in connexion with Medical Boards held under the auspices of his Department as a necessary preliminary to the assessment or re-assessment of military pensions.

2. Under the Athi River instructions, a Board of this nature must comprise three qualified medical practitioners. As Your Lordship is aware such a Board for this Protectorate can as a rule be formed only in Nairobi and occasionally in Mombasa with result that hitherto it has been necessary to call in to these centres applicants from any part of the Protectorate. This fact weighs heavily on both parties. The depleted and hard-worked Headquarters medical staff have been compelled to spend a considerable part of one day every week in examining pensioners.

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the former would be pensioners, whilst the latter, the most recent newcomers to the country, anxious to start work in their new sphere of life, are forced to waste several days valuable time in journeying between their place of residence and Nairobi at considerable expense. I have to ask, therefore, whether as far as this Protectorate is concerned, it would not be possible to limit the board in cases of re-assessment only to two or in exceptional instances to one Medical Officer at the discretion of the Principal Medical Officer. This would save time and travelling expenses and I do not anticipate that it would lead to any undesirable results.

3. There is no trace amongst local records of any regulations issued by the Ministry of Pensions in regard to journeys undertaken for the purpose of a Medical Board, but the Treasurer has addressed inquiries on the subject to the Ministry of Pensions. - The present practice is to allow free return railway tickets to all members of the Imperial Forces in accordance with their rank but this concession cannot be given to Imperial Pensioners without the prior authority of the Ministry of Pensions or the War Office, as the Government has been given no responsibility in such cases. Travelling and hotel expenses are considerable and no notifications have been made by pensioners for the additional acceptance of this charge by the State.
